Hair.

Animal hair differs in construction from that grown on a human head. In human hair the upper skin is smooth and thin. The tubular part is thin, extending to about one-fifth and certainly not more than to one-quarter of the entire width of the hair. Animal hair also consists of three parts, but these are differently constructed, the tube often filling the entire hair.
