BALL GAME AND RACES

Atkinson Wins Game on Score of Three to Two.

FOLLOWED BY TROTTING RACES

Home Horses Give Speed Exhibition At Afternoon Matinee.—Events Well Attended.

Manager Tommy Campbell of Atkinson brought his unconquerable braves to O'Neill Friday morning to cross bats with the undefeated O'Neill warriors. He also brought an umpire, who, excepting pitcher Kirkland, was the best man on the team. When Campbell's braves struck town they were sure of victory and for a few moments had some coin of the realm which they desired to place upon the results of the game, but as soon as O'Neill money appeared they suddenly decided that it would not be in keeping with morality ethics to put a wager upon the national game so "backed down." In fact one Atkinsonite who had placed twenty-five simeoleons upon his team early in the morning crawled and the O'Neill sport allowed him to draw his money. Lucky O'Neill! About eighty of the finest looking ladies and gentlemen of our sister city came with the ball team to cheer them on to victory and while cheering from the Atkinson corner was rather low until the seventh inning they made up for lost time as soon as opportunity presented. The game was as fine an exhibition

of the national game as one could possibly see, being a pitchers battle from beginning to end, with honors about even. While Atkinson secured two more hits off Bradley than O'Neill secured off Kirkland the hits were not secured until opportunity was presented to retire the side.

In the first Gabagan was out from short to first. Smith was easy, pitcher to first. With two down Kirkland passed Wilson, then hit Shea advancing Wilson to second. Bradley then came up and placed a two bagger in left field upon which both Wilson and Shea crossed the plate. The umpire, after taking the matter under advisement, called it a foul and sent them back. With one strike on him Bradley nailed the next one over for a nice single which scored Wilson and Shea but Bradley was caught at second in attempting to make it a double. Result—O'Neill 2. The first Atkinson man to bat got a nice single but he never got off of first the next two up fanning the breeze, the third going out pitcher to first. Nothing doing on either side until the seventh, Atkinson getting but two hits before this, the one in the first by Hale and one in the third by Kirkland. In the seventh Chambers, the first man up was out, Biglin to Wilson; Douglas got a hit and in trying to catch him at first Shea threw to Wilson, the latter playing off too far could not reach the ball and Douglas took second. By virtue of the poor eyesight of umpire Whillhite, E. Tomsick walked, Snyder hit to Bradley who threw wild to first and Douglas scored. Kirkland then got a hit and the bases were

In O'Neill's half of the seventh Shea fanned, Bradley went out, third to first. With two down Coffey walked, Coyne got a nice hit which advanced Coffey, Biglin was then given four wide ones. With two down and the bases full Hammond came up. Herb had a chance here to have his name emblazoned in letters of gold in the base ball history of O'Neill, to be the hero of the small boy and the champion of champions to O'Neill's fair charmers. But he was unequal to the task, with three balls and two strikes upon him he threw himself down to get out of the way of one of Kirkland's ins and the ump's says "your out." This ended our only chance to score and Atkinson was never near the plate except in the seventh. Score:
