New and Liberal Homestead Regulations IN Western Canada NEW DISTRICTS

Now Open for Settlement!

Some of the choicest lands in the grain growing belts of Saskatchewan and Alberta have recently been offered for settlement under the Revised Homestead Regulations of Canada. These lands total 160 acres each and are very valuable. The new regulations make it possible for entry to be made by proxy the opportunity that many in the United States have been waiting for. Any member of a family may make application for entry on behalf of the family or may be entitled to make entry for himself or his wife. Entry may now be made before the Agent or Sub-Agent of the District by proxy (on certain conditions) by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

"Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less."

The fee in each case will be \$10.00. Church schools and markets convenient. Healthy climate, granite mountains, grain growing and cattle raising principal industries.
