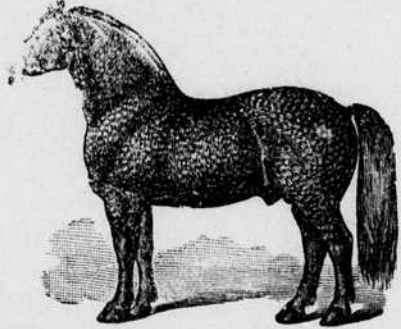

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Record of the Official Proceedings of That Body.

O'Neill, Nebr., June 25, 1908, 9 o' a. m. Board called to order, all members present.

ROAD PETITION.
To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Holt county, Nebraska: We, the undersigned electors residing within five miles of the following road proposed to be opened, ask that a public road be established as follows: Commencing at the SE cor. sec. 8, and the SW cor. sec. 9, twp. 26, range 13, thence due north eight (8) continuous miles to the SE cor. sec. 32, and the SW cor. sec. 33, twp. 28, range 13, in Holt county, Nebraska. And we deposit herewith the sum of \$— to pay for the consideration of such road, the expense thereof to be paid out of such deposit unless the road is finally established.

Dated March 4, 1908.
We, the undersigned petitioners pray for the establishment of the above described road and relinquish all our claims for damages.

Upon motion the petition of Frank E. Patterson, for a refund of taxes, was denied.

Upon motion the prayer of the petition of Albert Eriksen for annulling of personal tax assessed in Holt county for the year 1907 was denied, for the reason that Holt county has the prior right to such tax.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Holt county, Nebraska.

Petition for refund of taxes erroneously collected by county treasurer on tax sale.

Your petitioner respectfully represents unto your honorable body that on the 11th day of November, 1905, the county treasurer of Holt county sold to P. H. Nalty the following described real estate, to-wit:

The east half of the east half, of section fourteen, in township thirty-two, north of range fourteen, west of the sixth principal meridian, at the regular Scavenger tax sale and that the said P. H. Nalty paid the purchase price of said tract of land for the years 1903 and 1904 and thereafter said purchaser paid taxes for the year on said land as subsequent tax on said sale, said tax being paid on the 9th day of May, 1906, and thereafter said purchaser paid as subsequent tax of the year 1906 on said land, said payment being made on the 25th day of May, 1907. That on or about the 9th day of May, 1908, when your petitioner, being the assignee of said tax sale and subsequent taxes; paid thereunder, went to pay the tax for the year 1907, which he paid in the sum of \$5.32 upon said land as subsequent taxes under said sale, he discovered that said tract of land was not taxable, the same being government land, and that said land was unoccupied and unentered government land at the time it was sold at tax sale, no final receipt or patents ever having been issued upon said land down to the present time and said land not being subject to taxation at the time it was sold or at the time said taxes were levied thereon nor down to the present time.

Your petitioner says that there is due him by reason of the payments made for said tax sale and subsequent taxes and legal interest thereon the sum of twenty-nine and 70-100 dollars, and he prays your honorable body to make an order upon the county treasurer of this county to refund to your petitioner said sum of twenty-nine and 70-100 dollars (\$29.70).

Upon motion the prayer of the petition was granted, and treasurer ordered to redeem said tax sale and treasurer granted refund for the same.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Holt county, Nebraska.—Gentlemen: Your petitioner represents that he paid taxes for the year 1903 on the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 12, twp. 33-14. That said land was sold for the tax of 1903 and that the same was redeemed by me this 19th day of June, 1908. I ask for a refund of the amount \$1.38 of tax erroneously collected twice.

Baker, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, and respectfully represents that on November 11, 1905, he purchased at tax sale in the name of J. C. Gallagher, the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, sec. 17, twp. 31, range 14, w., being for the delinquent taxes for the year 1904, assessed against said tract, and received Certificate of tax sale No. 2890, dated Nov. 11, 1905, and tax judgment sale receipt No. 284, for \$6.80, the amount of taxes against said tract for 1904, which said certificate and receipt are hereto attached. And that he is now advised by the county treasurer of Holt county that said sale was erroneous, the said taxes for the year 1904 having been previously paid.

Wherefore, the petitioner requests that appropriate action be taken by

your honorable board to secure to him the refunding of said \$6.80 so erroneously paid and received.

Buys California Bonds.

Fremont Tribune: State Treasurer Brian has returned from Sacramento, where he bought \$500,000 of California state bonds, bearing 4 per cent interest at par. He has arranged for the shipment of the bonds and they are expected to arrive in Lincoln at any time. He is not much impressed with the California statute, as interpreted by the attorney general of that state, that only certain kinds of government bank notes and gold are legal tender at the California state treasury. This statute caused Mr. Brian to send actual currency in payment of the bonds instead of bank exchange.

The bonds run for sixteen years, optional after six years. There is much of chance about the exact date the bonds will mature because under the arrangement provided by the California officers the bonds taken up after the six-year period are chosen by lot. Numbers corresponding to numbers on the outstanding bonds of the state will be placed in a box and drawn out and the numbers first drawn will be paid in the order of the drawing. There is a good chance for the state of Nebraska to hold a considerable part of the \$500,000 investment for sixteen years under this plan.

Engineers at Work.

Sioux City Journal, July 21: Engineers of the Burlington railroad working between O'Neill, Neb., and Theford and Dunning, on the main line to Billings Mont., have practically completed surveys for the proposed extension of the old Sioux City Short Line, now a part of the Burlington system, to the Burlington line into Colorado, Wyoming and the far northwest.

This activity of the engineering department, taken in connection with the work of the construction department in rebuilding the line between Sioux City and O'Neill, lends strength to the reports received by Sioux City business men that with the first return of railroad building this extension westward from O'Neill will be constructed.

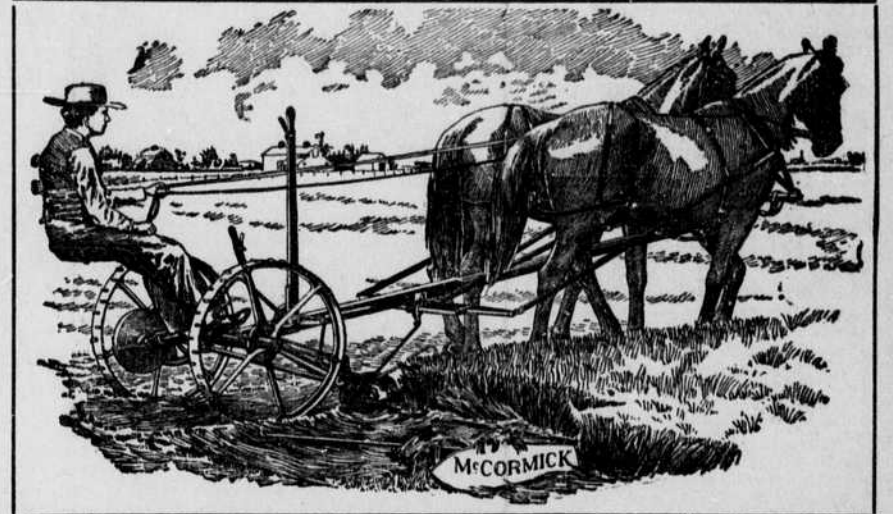

AN OLD TIME BREAKFAST.

What One Visitor Was Treated to at Washington's Home.

The diary of Manasse Cutler, the founder of Ohio and the author of the ordinance of 1787, gives an account of a visit he made to Mount Vernon two years after General Washington's death. We say "General" Washington, for that was what Mrs. Washington was pleased to call him—a copy for all those good women whose husbands have won them honor on the field of war.

Mr. Cutler says it was the desire of their party to arrive at Mount Vernon in time for breakfast (7 o'clock) with Mrs. Washington, but the bad roads and worse horses detained them, so they did not reach there until about 10, which Mrs. Washington regretted, but she said, "Breakfast would be ready in a few minutes." The diary goes on to say:

"In a short time she arose and desired us to walk into another room, where a table was elegantly spread with ham, cold corned beef, cold fowl, red herring and cold mutton, the dishes ornamented with sprigs of parsley and other vegetables from the garden. At the head of the table was the tea and coffee equipage, where she seated herself and sent the tea and coffee to the company."

The point of interest is that breakfast menu—five kinds of meat decked with sprigs of parsley and accompanied with divers vegetables. Isn't there an appetizing array and doesn't the heart long for just such a scene? Of course the mere feeders, the fellows that hanker for hot things, may not think so, but the very mention of cold ham, cold chicken, cold mutton and cold corned beef all in the same breath is an appeal to a conscientious appetite that is irresistible. And that was a breakfast of the long ago.

Most generous providers these well to do people in the early days! How good everything must have tasted! That roast chicken and roast mutton and that—great tender clean chunks of it, that he would not dare say which was best, for each was best. Compare it with our latter day breakfasts—a roll and an egg and a cup of coffee! Of course we like our way, but that is possibly because these are degenerate days.—Ohio State Journal.
