D. Grimes of Chambers, Fifth district, democrat and populist. There are republican candidates in two supervisor districts and fusionist in one to file yet, besides candidates for representatives.

Conrad Kramer comes out for the republican nomination for supervisor in the seventh district and N. D. Segar for the demo-pop nomination. H. A. Allen of Atkinson filed a pefition to be placed on the ticket for the republican nomination for representative from the west end of the county. STRAIGHTEN THE RIVER

County Surveyor Makes Plat of Short Cut.

TAKE CROOKS OUT OF ELKHORN

Believed Great Saving May be Effected in Matter of Bridges.-Winding Channel South of Town.

Suveyor Norton is preparing a plat of a route for the proposed straightening of the channel of the Elkhorn river just south of O'Neill. The project has been under consideration by the board of supervisors for some time. The proposed change entails the cutting of a new channel north of the river bed commencing at a point about 500 feet west of Hagerty's lake and running east nearly on a straight line to the river just below the 75-foot steel bridge just south of town. This would carry the river under that bridge, some 500 or 600 feet north of the present river bridge.
