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MINDEN MURDERER GIVES HIMSELF UP

Tired of Being Hounded, Bert Taylor Is Arrested, Claiming His Innocence.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 14.—With the statement that he was worried to the perdition with being hunted as the perpetrator of crimes at Minden, Kearney county, Nebraska, with a price of \$1,900 hung over his head, a man giving his name as Bert M.
