Redbird item in Lynch Journal: Question to the people and taxpayer of the north part of Holt county: Are you going to pay taxes and interest on outstanding bonds, on road and bridge and then have no bridge. Niobrara Subsidizing.

However a channel of considerable width has been cut across the bottom land south of the bridge and it will be necessary to change the road to the east and the building of a small bridge.
