An Omaha Firm Secures the Contract Wednesday Evening.

WILL COMMENCL WORK SOON

And Expect to Have the System Completed in Ninety Days.

The contract for the construction of the O'Neill sewer system was let by the mayor and city council last evening to Donohoe & Peterson of Omaha for \$16,507.46.

Five bids were submtted for the work, that of the successful bidders being but a few dollars lower than that of the next bidder. The other bids filed were as follows: E. L. Dimick Laurel, Nebr., \$16,635.00; J. A. Pringle Kansas City, Mo., \$17,482.70; Donigan & Briggs Shenandoah, Iowa, \$18,786.50; H. J. Cathro Omaha, \$18,-435.77. Mr. Cathro was the only contractor who submitted a bid on the work the last time and his bid at that time was approximatly \$20,000.00.

Contracts were drawn up with the successful bidders today and they will commence work as soon as the material can be secured. They figure that they will be going in full blast by August 1, and expect to complete the system in three months. Some idea of the magnitude of system can be twenty car loads of pipe to complete the system.
