Teddy Roosevelt was about the whole show at the republican state convention in New York the first of the week. He defeated Vice-President Sherman for the chairmanship of the convention, after a bitter contest with the old machine. He then named all the important committees of the convention, including the committee on resolutions, and the Empire state will undoubtedly take her place in the ranks of the progressives.

The Triumph of Teddy.

Lincoln News: The substantial victory of Roosevelt in the New York convention yesterday marks the beginning of the end of boss rule in that state. When insurgency reaches out after and grabs hold of the Empire state it is surely going some. Few people out here in Nebraska, where we have a large variety of politics, can understand the real sordidness of politics in New York state. There the control of both parties, the inner

machinery, has been in the hands of about as ruthless a set of men as can well be imagined. They have sold legislation by the yard, and have made no particular secret about the transactions. In New York city are located a large number of corporations that can find profit in favorable legislation, and they have negotiated for it without scruple. Both parties had groups of men who could deliver the goods, sometimes in exchange for cash or stocks or sometimes in exchange for campaign contributions and political aid at election time. Until Roosevelt was drafted to make the fight the decent people of that commonwealth have had no man to make the fight to dethrone this crew of political pirates in charge of the republican ship. The fact that he was able to win indicates that the tide has turned, and that decent politics may have an inning in New York. It will be interesting to see whether the democracy will make a bid for the support of the dethroned regulars. It is a good guess that they will, and at the November election, by appealing to party pride, hope to defeat progressive republicanism. Whether this is the result matters little; New York republicans have shown their ability to clean their own political stables, and they will gain the final reckoning. Vice President Sherman, who lent the weight of his name and his position to the fight to keep the old guard in power and who practically countenanced the trickery that turned the state committee against Roosevelt, emerges with considerable discredit.
