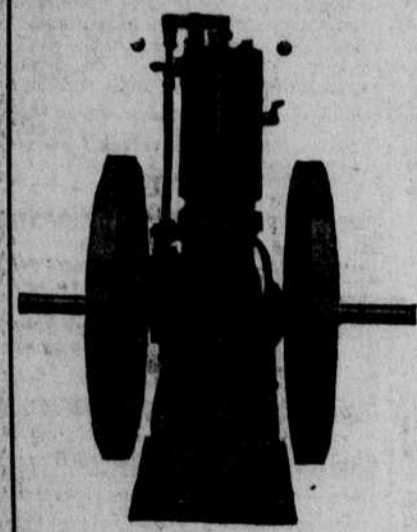

When He Had to Work He Started a Dainty Rolling Mill.

I was just entering upon my thirty-fourth year when, owing to the failure of my wife's father, I found myself obliged to make a living.

I had often wondered where all the steel rails came from, and now I determined to go into the business of supplying them to railroad companies. Then I called on a railroad president, told him that I desired to become self supporting and asked him to buy some of my rails. He told me to deliver a basketful to his place of business every Saturday night.

Greatly elated over my prospects, I called together a number of workmen whom I found idle on the streets and directed them to make some nice steel rails without delay and take them around to the kind railroad president.

Rejoicing at the prospect of steady employment, the workmen hastened to obey, and the rails that they made under my direction proved so durable that in a very short time I had all the orders that I could fill.

I attribute much of my success to the fact that each rail is delivered to the customer tastefully wrapped in tissue paper fastened with pink rib-
