Disastrous Prairie Fire.


Stuart Advocate: At noon today, one of the worst prairie fires to visit this section for several years, started about nine miles northwest of Stuart, at the Asa Boyce place, formerly the Mrs. Asa Smith place, and, driven by a sixty mile wind from the northwest, swept with almost inconceivable rapidity in a southeasterly direction. and only diverted from the village of Stuart by the herculean efforts of a large force of men who had quickly assembled to fight the common enemy. The south edge of the fire was stopped only a few rods north of the village and the head fire rushed past on its devasting course, and was soon threatening our sister town of Atkinson. It is impossible at this time to estimate the damage done, but a partial list is: Joe Miller lost his barn, granary and other out build ings, Joe Schmoderer, E. C. Hart, A J. Hahn and Les Roberts lost all their or two small stacks, Henry Knowles R. J. Jennings, Agent. lost all his buildings and the hay on the place, Geo. Norton lost some hay. Others, of course, lost heavily in the burned strip which will average about two miles wide and twenty miles long. It appeared at one time that the Village of Stuart would surely be burn ed, and the women and children, who were almost alone in the town, were nearly frantic. It is certainly wonderful how quickly a great crowd assembles upon these occasions. Men from ten to twelve miles in all directions were soon on hand and did valiant service. A number from Newport were here and the C. & N. W. Ry. Co. sent a special train from Long Pine to Stuart when the village was threatened, and, finding the town afe, gathered up more men here and went to Atkinson to help protect that
