The state of Nebraska has put in a claim against Holt county for \$3,414.93 for caring for insane patients from December 1, 1885, to July 31, 1891. Prior to 1891 the different counties of the state were supposed to pay direct for the care of their insane, but many

of them did not do so and as a result nearly \$100,000.00 was found to be due the state from the different counties of the state for the care of their insane, Holt county's deficiency to that fund being the above amount. Since 1891 the care of the insane has been taken care of by indirect taxation, the money being appropriated by the legislature. Supervisor Sullivan is busy this week checking up the old insane records of the county to see if the records in the county compare with those kept by the state auditor, and if found correct the county board will have to provide some means of paying the claim.
