

PROTEST PHONE RATE RAISE

Hebron Citizens Threaten to Take Out Their Telephones.

Hebron, Neb., Sept. 2.—A meeting was held in this city to resent the effort of the Lincoln Telegraph and Telephone company to force a higher rate of toll. Three hundred citizens and farmers were present. Nearly every man in the company signed an agreement to discard his phone in case a raise by the railway commission was ordered and there was strong talk of carrying the same to the supreme court for an ultimate decision as to whether the commission has the power to say what shall be the charge for a local toll. The Farmers' Society of Equity—ninety-five members—through a committee, agreed to discard the local Hebron service in case the raise was ordered.

Petitions are to be circulated in this vicinity, asking signers to take out their phones, and every person who signed their intention so to do, and it is estimated that over three hundred phones will be dead as soon as the effort to raise rates is made.

GUARDSMEN START ON 16-MILE MARCH

Body of Lieutenant Cruncleton Taken to Joplin For Burial.

Ashland, Neb., Sept. 2.—The national guardsmen in camp here left this morning for a sixteen-mile march to Greta and return. Each man carries one day's rations. The militia signal corps from Fremont established wireless communication.

The flag over the encampment was at half-mast until noon in honor of Lieutenant Cruncleton, killed in an accident occurring while riding a horse. Private Snyder of company K had two ribs broken while wrestling. Teams chosen from the various companies are competing in athletic events.

Beatrice, Neb., Sept. 2.—Funeral services over the remains of the late Lieutenant C. M. Cruncleton, who lost his life at the guard encampment at Ashland when a horse he was riding fell upon him, were held from the Episcopal church and were largely attended. Rev. W. A. Mulligan conducted the services. Preceding the regular services at the church the Elks held a brief service in the chapel of their club room.

Adjutant General Hall, Major Hollingsworth, Lieutenants Gillihan and Davis and Sergeant Austin came down from the guard encampment to attend the funeral.

RETURNS IN STEE AGE

Seward Doctor Says Food Was Bad and Water Scarce.

Seward, Neb., Sept. 2.—Dr. J. S. Anderson, who went to Europe to attend an international meeting of veterinarians, came home in the steerage of the St. Louis. Food was very bad and a small amount of water was doled out. Miss Munson, kindergarten teacher in the Seward city schools, had a first class cabin on the same boat and managed to give some of her rations to a steerage passenger, who was very ill.

Boy Sent to Reform School.

Broken Bow, Neb., Sept. 2.—Clyde Orvis, lacking one month of being eighteen years of age, has been sentenced to three years in the reform school by County Judge Holcomb, the charge against him being statutory assault. His victim was a fifteen-year-old girl who lives near Milburn. Had he been one month older, the boy would have received a sentence from three to twenty years in the penitentiary. The sheriff has taken him to Kearney.

Nebraska Middy Allowed to Resign.

Washington, Sept. 2.—On account of alleged misconduct during the recent summer cruise, three Annapolis midshipmen have been asked to resign. Simon J. Lonergan of Nebraska, of the first class, and Thomas L. Chalmers of New Hampshire, of the third class, already have resigned and the authorities are awaiting the resignation of the third, Manuel J. Jemall of Rhode Island. The nature of the delinquencies was not disclosed.

Man Drowned Near Plattsmouth.

Plattsmouth, Neb., Sept. 2.—Oscar Lloyd, aged thirty-five years, who was drowned in the Missouri river six miles south of Plattsmouth, was well known as a sawmill operator. The body has not been found. He was in the river bathing with his brother, Oliver, and a large number of friends.

Next Conference in Omaha.

Callaway, Neb., Sept. 2.—The eighteenth annual conference of the United Evangelical church of Nebraska closed its session after holding forth in this city the past week. The next session of conference will be held in Omaha on Aug. 26 to 30, 1915.

Steamer Reaches Boston.

Boston, Sept. 2.—The steamer Devonian of the Leyland line arrived from Liverpool, with 150 passengers, principally Americans, who fled from Europe after the outbreak of the war.
