Credit comes next. If you had to dig up cash for the stuff you would be more careful what you buy. There is a good many times you only need a shoe string and you don't have the money, so in order to get the shoe string charged you buy a pair of shoes and maybe a necktie and a stickpin.

The delivery wagons make it easy to stay at home, so you will not go to the cash store. Because if you had to come down after stuff you would never go to a credit store with a delivery and pay such prices.

The government cannot help you and the prices will be higher, because you want so much service that you have got to pay for it. You would not buy cattle, hogs or horses over the phone or out of a catalogue. So why buy the other stuff? You would not buy many cattle if you had to pay forty and 50 per cent interest. Well, ain't the other stuff just as important? But I might just as well try to get the Kaiser to cut out war, so let the prices climb. Remember this: The more wagons and the more telephones and the more credit, the more I can make on my stuff, and the more you have to pay for yours. This was what these big men found was the cost of high living and that the people themselves were to blame, and were willing to pay for the service, so the U.
