Mr. Chairman: "Be it resolved that the County Board of Supervisors of Holt County, Nebraska, at this regular meeting at the Court House in O'Neill, Nebraska, on this 5th day of April, 1918, hereby accept all the

provisions of the Federal and State Aid Road Acts, as provided in House Bill 7617 of the 64th Congress of the United States (39 Stat. 355) and House Roll 722 of the 1917 session of the Nebraska Legislature, approved April 19, 1917, and make application for state and Federal Funds for Holt county, as apportioned in said House Roll 722, to construct the following roads: Beginning at the SW corner of section 6, township 30, range 16 west, thence east on the section line to the northeast corner of section 7, township 30, range 15 west; thence south on the section line to the SW corner of section 29 of said township and range; thence east on the section line to the SW corner of section 28, township 30, range 14; thence south on the section line to the SW corner of section 33, township 30, range 14; thence east on the section line to the southwest corner of section 36, thence south to the SW corner of section 1, of township 29, and range 14, thence east on the section line to the SW corner of section 1, township 29, range 12; thence south to the quarter line in section 25, said town and range; thence east to SW corner of NW quarter of section 29, township 29, range 11; thence south to the SW corner of section 29, said township and range; thence east on the section line to the SW corner of section 25, township 29, range 10; thence south to the SW corner of section 36, said township and range; thence east to the NW corner of section 6, township 28, range 9; thence south to the SW corner of section 18, said township 28, range 9; thence east to SW corner of section 15, said town and range; thence south to the SW corner of section 22, said town and range; thence east to the SW corner of section 23, said town and range, thence south on the section line to the SW corner of section 2, township 26, range 9; thence east to the SE corner of section 1, township 26, range 9.

Beginning at the NE corner of section 5, township 29, range 14, thence south on the section line to the southeast corner of section 32, township 27, range 14; thence south to the NW corner of section 16, township 26, range 14; thence east to the NE corner of section 16; thence south to the SE corner of section 33, township 25, range 14.

Beginning at the center of the east section line of section 30, township 29, range 11 (O'Neill); thence north on the section line through said township 29, townships 30 and 31 to the northeast corner of section 6, township 31, range 11 (Meek); thence west on section line to SW corner of section 31, township 32, range 11; thence north on the section line to the northeast corner of section 1, township 32, range 12, (correction line); thence east on section line to the center of south line of section 31, township 33, range 11; continuing north through section 31 and 30, in township 33, range 11, to the State Aid Bridge across the Niobrara river.

For and in consideration of the above specified roads being constructed with Federal and State Funds, the Board of County Supervisors of Holt county, Nebraska, hereby pledge the good faith and credit of the county of Holt, Nebraska, to furnish all of the right of way on the above designated roads, free of cost to the Federal Government and state of Nebraska, to provide funds for and continuously maintain the above specified roads after the construction of the same, as provided in the above mentioned acts.

We also pledge said county of Holt, Nebraska, to construct and maintain all bridges on the above specified roads where the clear water way exceeds

thirty-six (36) square feet, and within thirty days after the above described roads have been completed we agree to designate same as county roads as provided in House Roll 722 passed by the 1917 Legislature of Nebraska.

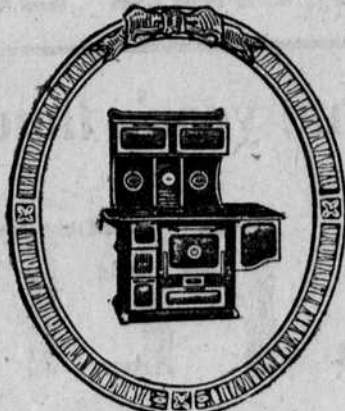
