## DEMOCRATIC SIMPLICITY.

Kansas City Star: The United States has prided itself on a certain simplicity that it has maintained in its representation in Europe. American ambassadors never have worn court costumes. Their manner of living has been studiously unostentatious.

Benjamin Franklin, probably America's greatest diplomat, set the fashion when he appeared at the gorgeous court of France in his sober Quaker raiment of colonial russet, without a wig and wearing his famous cap of marten fur.

No American wishes to be penurious in the nation's provision for the comfort of those who shall attend the peace conference. But it is something of a shock to read that the most magnificent hotel in Paris, that has always been reserved for royalty has been leased for a year by the United States for \$400,000; that the bureau of public information is to have an enormous furnished mansion at Versailles; and that a former Atlantic liner was refitted to take the members of the mission and their wives, under the escort of a battle fleet.

Evidently an expenditure of several million dollars is planned in connection with America's representation at the conference. This is being done at a time when people are being urged to save every penny possible to invest in thrift stamps to pay the expense of the government.

The combination doesn't sit well.

**Obey Quarantine Or Be Prosecuted.**  
The State Department of Health held its recent conference to decide principally two things.

First: Are the various counties, cities and villages sufficiently organized to render efficient aid to their health departments in putting down this epidemic?

Second: In the event that the State Department of Health were to declare influenza an absolutely quarantinable disease, would the counties, cities and villages see that the quarantine was promptly enforced and strictly maintained?

The first proposition was unanimously answered in the affirmative, the second almost so, by representatives from almost every county in the state. The State Department of Health has accordingly made this an absolutely quarantinable disease and it is expected that the counties, cities and villages in whose jurisdiction cases occur, will see that the regulations are obeyed and violations promptly prosecuted.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Holt County, Nebraska.

We, the undersigned residents of Scott township, hereby respectfully inform and give your honorable body to understand that the section line running east and west between sections eleven (11) and fourteen (14) in township thirty-two (32), range ten (10), west of the sixth principal meridian, and the south eighty (80) rods of the section line running north and south between sections eleven (11) and twelve (12), in township thirty-two (32), range ten (10), west of the sixth principal meridian, all in Scott township, Holt county, Nebraska, are in such condition that the establishment of a road thereon is impracticable and impossible because of the nature of the territory and the conditions therein existing upon said section lines as hereinbefore indicated and that it is impossible and impracticable to construct roads on those parts of said county above described section lines, and that it is necessary to have a public road through such territory or in the near vicinity thereof.

We, therefore, petition your honorable body to grant and establish a public road in or near said territory described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing on road No. 2 at a point 7.42 chains north of the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 11, township 32, north of range 10 west, and running thence north 83 d. 20 min. west 20.46 chains, thence in the west one quarter of said quarter of said quarter section south 60 d. west 5.66 chains, thence south 24 d. 20 min. west 1.41 chains, thence south 7 d. 7 min. east 2.91 chains, thence south 26 d. 45 min. east 3.94 chains, thence south 43 d. 56 min. east 2.90 chains, thence south on or near the one-quarter one-quarter section line 17.76 chains to road No. 2 at one-quarter corner and there terminating.

You are hereby notified that you have this day been appointed a Commissioner to view and report upon the expediency of establishing a public road petitioned for by W. H. Wilson, Fred Richter and others, and described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing on road No. 2, at a point 7.42 chains north of the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 11, township 32 north, range 10 west and running thence north 83 d. 20 min. west 20.46 chains. Thence in the west one quarter of said quarter section. South 60 d. west 5.66 chains, thence south 24 d. 20 min. west 1.41 chains. Thence south 7 d. 7 min. east 2.91 chains, thence south 26 d. 45 min. east 3.94 chains, thence south 43 d. 56 min. east 2.90 chains, thence south on or near the one-quarter one-quarter section line 17.76 chains to road No. 2 at the one-quarter corner and there terminate.

In accordance with the appointment and copy of petition hereunto attached and made a part of this report, after taking into consideration both public and private convenience and expense of a road to fill the place of the part of Road No. 2, which is not now in use and never has been used. And realizing the immediate need of an open road with a passable grade, and having run this line and staked the same to the most practical grade, and on firm land that will make a hard road bed at the least expense. I deem it expedient that the same be established as follows, to-wit:

Commencing on Road No. 2 at a point 7.42 chains north of the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 11, township 32, north range 10 west. Said center line of road being described as running:

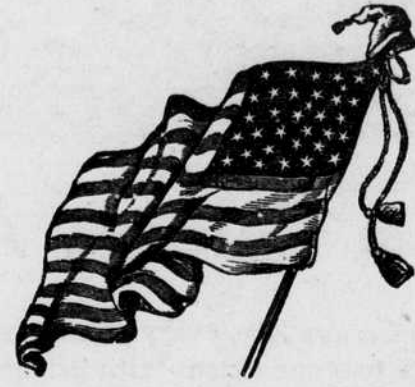
