Many farmers have inquired regarding the sowing of sweet clover in a field where there is a poor stand of al-falfa. I have the following letter from E. C. Waters, of Atkinson, one of the most experienced sweet clover growers in the county and it will be f interest to many farmers. Any farmer desiring sweet clover seed for spring seeding should look over the exchange list and purchase at once as there is a big demand for seed and it will soon be sold out.


