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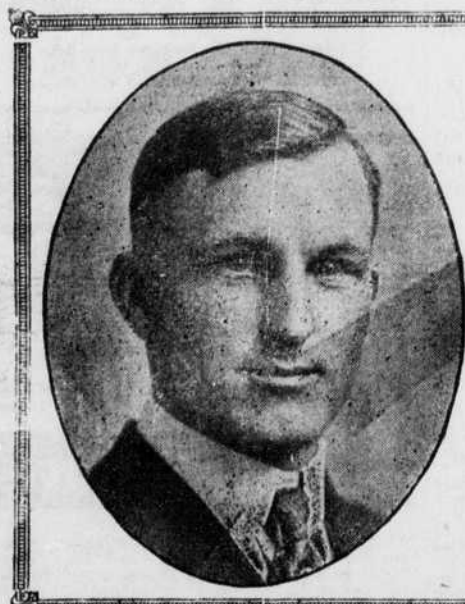

Naturally he hunted up Sheriff McFadden to report his loss and seek expert aid in locating the missing machine. Sheriff McFadden quickly started his usual lecture about the provisions of the automobile law when Dr. Davie explained that he had ordered his license to his home at Fremont, and it was to have been sent to him at O'Neill, but when he heard of the good races to be seen here he did not wait for it but came over at once, bringing Sheriff Duffy along for protection. Sheriff McFadden finally relented and let the doughty representative of the law in Holt county start home with the flivver.

BERGDOLL'S ESCAPE.

Camden (N. J.)
