Since all these thousands of millions were appropriated by a Republican Congress which began its work a year ago last May, a Congress which has refused to make peace and done nothing toward the reduction of war taxation, the blame cannot be shifted to the Executive Department. Well, let's see. In the first place

included in the five billions of dollars which is still the annual cost to this country of conducting this government there is about \$1,000,000,000 required to wind up the stupendously unsuccessful attempt of Mr. Wilson' adminstraton to operate the American railway system as a government institution. These railroad contracts were in existence, signed, sealed and delivered when the republican party took control of Congress. These contracts, if it had been honorable and wise to void them, could not have been legally voided by the United States Congress.

In the second place, included in the five billions is about another billion of dollars interest due on the money borrowed by Mr. Wilson's administration and spent by Mr. Wilson's administration during the war.
