Petition for approval of proposed sale of incompetent person's real estate. To the County Board of Supervisors of Holt County, Nebraska.

A. D. Havens, Guardian of Adda Spence, an incompetent person respectfully represents to your Honorable Body and states: That Adda Spence is an incompetent person over the age of seventy years; that she is now and has been for many years a resident of the city of Atkinson, Holt County, Nebraska, that she is greatly enfeebled by age and sickness and is an incompetent person incapable of performing any labor or of taking care of herself in any proper manner.

That on July 22, 1920, petitioner was duly appointed Guardian of the person and estate of the said Adda

Spence and he is now acting as the guardian of said incompetent person. That the said Adda Spence is possessed of no personal property whatever except clothing of little value.

That she is the owner of the following described real estate situated in the City of Atkinson, Holt County, Nebraska, to-wit: Lot Number Eleven (11), in Block "K" in David Neely's Second Addition to the town of Atkinson, Holt County, Nebraska, of the value of \$700.00.

That said Adda Spence has no means whatever to support herself except a widow's pension in the sum of \$30.00 paid her by United States monthly.

That the dwelling house situated upon said real estate owned by said incompetent person is in bad repair. That said incompetent person has no means to repair the same, and if repaired its rental value would not exceed the sum of \$10.00 per month.

That the cost of the support and maintenance of said incompetent person is not less than \$50.00 per month and that it is necessary that said real estate be sold for her support and maintenance.

That there is no property of said Adda Spence in the possession of your petitioner which can be applied to the support and maintenance of said incompetent person and your petitioner desires to obtain a license from the District Court of Holt County, Nebraska, for the sale of said property for the support and maintenance of the said incompetent person.

Your petitioner therefore respectfully requests that your Honorable Body certify to the Judge of the District Court of said County your approval of said proposed sale.
