O'NEILL-THEFORD CUT OFF BEING SURVEYED

Burlington and Great Northern engineers and surveyors are at work going over the line of the proposed Burlington extension from O'Neill to Theford, which will hook up Minneapolis direct with Denver and the west by way of O'Neill. The surveying party of Burlington men has been at work on the proposed route, working this way from Theford. They were joined last week by engineering officials of the Great Northern from Minneapolis, who came to O'Neill over the Burlington and then went to Bassett on the Northwestern, driving from there south to join the surveying party near Ak-Sar-Ben in southern Rock county. The new road, if built, will cross the Calamus river south of Duff and southwest of Ak-Sar-Ben in Rock county. The route will be as near as possible an air line one from O'Neill to Theford.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE GAME LAWS.

A continuous open season on all game fish except trout, pike and perch is provided for in the new game laws enacted by the recent session of the legislature. Following are the provisions of the new game laws: H. R. 399, is a voluminous bill. It is in fact a revision of every line of the present game laws with many additions thereto. This bill defines the duties of the department of agriculture in regard to conservation, propagation, distribution, introduction and restoration of game, wild fowls, birds, and fish. The act imposes on the department of agriculture, the duty of enforcing the law and of recovering fines and penalties for violation. Many changes are made in the open season dates, the seasons for traps and permits and the size of traps and

alties. The "open season" on trout, pike and pike perch is April 1 to October 31 next ensuing. Open season on all other fish the whole year round. There is a size limit on all game fish. The limit ranges from six inches to twelve inches. It is unlawful for any person to catch in one day an excess of twenty-five fish or have in possession at any one time an excess of fifty game fish. The penalty is \$15. The open season for prairie chickens extends from October 1 to November 1, inclusive. The penalty for violation is \$50. It is unlawful for any one to have in his possession at any one time an excess of fifty game birds. The fine for violating this provision of the act is \$100. The open season for ducks and wild geese is from September 16 to December 31. Every person over sixteen years of age must have a license to hunt, fish or trap. This provision applies to women as well as men. The open season for squirrels is from September 16 to October 31, but owners or tenants may "protect their property" as the bill diplomatically says. Ten is the daily limit, and twenty is the maximum number to have in one's possession. Carp, suckers, gars and buffalo fish may be speared during the entire year. Catfish of legal size taken from the Missouri river may be sold under permit issued by the department of agriculture. Dealers must be able to prove that fish sold were taken from the Missouri river or shipped in from without the state. Seining in the Missouri river is permitted upon giving a license fee and payment of a license fee graded in accordance with the size of the seine. Only the department of agriculture may seine streams within the state. Minnows may be taken or sold only for use as bait. There is no open season on doves, quail, wood ducks or eider ducks. The department is authorized to deputize persons to sell licenses to hunt, fish and trap and a fee of ten cents on each license issued in excess of the license fee may be collected. Bird dogs are not allowed to run loose in game bird fields between April 1 and September 1. The open season for trapping fur-bearing animals is from November 1

February 1. H. R. 424. This act provides that within three months from the time the act becomes effective, the state department of agriculture shall examine and select suitable sites for a state fish hatchery in Lincoln or Garden counties. For the expenses connected with the acquisition of the hatchery and necessary buildings and equipment for its use during the biennium, the act provides for an appropriation out of the general fund in the sum of \$10,000 or as much of such amount as may be required. H. R. 596. A separate law enacted by the legislature, establishes a state fish conservation lake near Peru and authorizes the department of agriculture to expend such amount of the fees received from hunting and fishing licenses, as shall be required to carry into effect the provisions of the act. The state department of agriculture is authorized to spend such amount as is necessary for the purpose of diking

the lake, keeping the supply of water therein, and for such other purposes in connection with the object of the act as shall promote conservation and propagation of fish in the lake. S. F. 256. This law establishes an area in the state of Nebraska to be set aside and designated as a state game refuge. The purpose is to provide better protection and establish breeding places for birds and animals. All that portion of the state embraced
