Fruits and Vegetables—Northern sacked Round White potatoes up 20-25c per 100 lbs. at shipping points, closing 80-95c. Chicago carlot market up 10-15c at 90-\$1.05. South Carolina No. 1 Irish cobbles \$7-\$7.25 per cloth top elat barrel New York. Texas sacked Bliss Triumphs down 25c per 100 lbs. middle-western cities at \$4-\$4.50.
New York cold storage A2 1/2 Baldwin apples down \$1 per bbl. New York \$7-\$7.50; up \$1 Pittsburgh at \$7.75-\$8. Medium size extra fancy northwestern Winesaps up 25c per box Chicago at \$3-\$3.50 small sizes \$2.25-\$2.75.
Texas Yellow Bermuda onions slightly weaker in eastern markets at \$1.50-\$2 per standard crate commercial pack; moderately higher middle-western cities at \$1.25-\$2; shipping points steady around \$1 sales on wire orders, carloads f. o. b. shipping point acceptance.
Virginia Klondike strawberries down 8c per quart New York at 20-22c. Arkansas Klondikes \$2.50 per 24 quart crate, car-loads f. o. b. cash track May 14th. Tenn. Klondikes \$2.75-\$3.50 f. o. b.
Car Georgia early cling peaches sold Pittsburg jobbers May 14th at \$5 per six basket carrier.
Florida Watermelons, average weight 20-22 lbs. mostly \$1 each Chicago; 24-27 lb. stock jobbers \$1.25 each.
Hay—Receipts very light. Rains and farm work curtailing shipments. Demand generally limited to local city trade. Country consuming sections not buying but using pastures and local forage. No. 1 Timothy quoted New York \$29.50, Pittsburgh \$22.50, Cincinnati \$21.50, Chicago \$22.50. St. Louis \$26. No. 1 Alfalfa Omaha \$19, Minneapolis \$20, Atlanta \$33. No. 1 Prairie Kansas City \$14.50, Omaha \$12.50, Minneapolis \$16.
Feed—Market continues dull. Demand limited to immediate needs. With the exception of Glute n feed there is practically no buying for future delivery. Some cottonseed meal selling for export. Linseed meal dull. Not much change in price of principal feeds. Production of wheatfeeds still below normal, stocks light. Spring bran quoted Philadelphia \$25, Chicago \$10; soft winter bran Cincinnati \$23, St. Louis \$20; hard winter bran Kansas City \$10.57; spring middlings about \$1 under spring bran. Linseed meal Chicago \$31, New York \$36; 41 per cent cottonseed meal Kansas City \$35, Atlanta \$6 per cent \$23, St. Louis \$32; No. 1 Alfalfa Kansas City \$17.50, Chicago \$23; gluten Philadelphia \$31.71, Pittsburgh \$31.43, Chicago \$26.50.
Live Stock and Meats—Chicago hog prices declined 15c-30c per 100 lbs. the past week. Beef steers up 25c; butcher cows and heifers 25c-50c. Feeder steers up 25-35c; veal calves about steady. Fat lambs up 25-\$1 higher; feeding lambs 25-50c. Fat ewes gained 75-\$1. May 16 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales, \$8.15-\$8.70; medium and good beef steers \$7.50-\$9; butcher cows and heifers \$5.25-\$9; feeder steers \$7-\$8.50; light and medium weight veal calves \$7.50-\$9.50; fat lambs \$9.25-\$12; feeding lambs \$6.50-\$8.25; yearlings \$7.50-\$10; fat ewes \$6-\$7.50.
Stocker and feeder shipments from 11 important markets during the week ending May 6 were: Cattle and calves 25,809; hogs 5,985; sheep 9,291.
Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices changed but slightly. Beef averaged 50c lower per 100 pounds. Veal, lamb, mutton and pork loins practically unchanged. May 16th prices good grade meats: Beef \$15-\$16.50; veal \$16-

\$18; lamb \$28-\$26; mutton \$15-\$18; light pork loins \$23-\$25; heavy loins \$16-\$20.
Dairy Products—Butter markets weak, price tendency lower. Consumptive demand has been fairly good but reports that Danish butter has been offered as low as 28 1/2c duty paid has kept conditions somewhat unsettled. Some interest in storing. Production increasing. Closing prices 92 score: New York 30c; Chicago 29 1/4; Boston and Philadelphia 31c.
Cheese markets show more active trading following declines of past few weeks and have taken on more settled appearance. Prices Plymouth Wisconsin exchange but little changed from a week ago: Twins 12 3-8c; Daises and double daises 12 3-4c; Lonhorns 13c; Young Americas 131-8
Grain: Market unsettled and erratic most of week. There was a big advance on the 11th upon acceptance
