





The writer of this article, at the time lieutenant colonel of the military intelligence division of the general staff, United States army, was the American member of the Inter-Allied Mission which, under the leadership of General Smuts and under instructions from the peace conference in Paris, proceeded to southeastern Europe in March, 1919. 
