CUNO FORMS NEW GERMAN CABINET

Ministry Composed Wholly of Non-Socialists Expected to Be Short Lived.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—In the face of the opposition of 173 socialists in the reichstag, who for several days have sabotaged all efforts to get a new government together, Dr. Cuno tonight patched up a cabinet wholly of non-socialists. A short life is predicted for it.

At 10 o'clock tonight Dr. Cuno held a conference with President Ebert and presented a list of the cabinet which, according to unofficial but reliable information, consists of the following men:

Dr. Friedrich Sthamer, present ambassador to London, as foreign minister. Dr. Hermes, minister of finance. Dr. Gessler, minister of defense. Gen. Groener, minister of transport. Herr Stieglitz, a former railway official from Bavaria, minister of posts and telegraphs.

Fascisti Meets Stopped. BY KARL H. VON WIEGAND, Universal Service Correspondent, Munich, Bavaria, Nov. 20.—The first conflict between the Berlin government and the German fascisti headed by Adolph Hitler, has occurred.

Worried over the rapidly with which the national socialist movement (as the main branch of Germany's fascisti is known) is growing, the national German government last night intervened for the first time against the movement. The Berlin government ordered fascisti meetings at Hamburg and Hanover suppressed and ordered that the special train which had been granted to Hitler and 600 of his "shock troops" be cancelled.

Government Offers Alibi. The central government offered as an excuse for its action that the railway workers threatened a general strike if the special train was not cancelled forthwith.

TO FLY TO ARCTIC.

New York, Nov. 20 (A. P.)—Using a huge flying boat now under construction six Detroit sportsmen plan to fly to the Arctic circle next summer for a brief hunting trip. The party will comprise I. M. Upercu, Howard E. Coffin, Harold H. Hammons, Dr. Jean W. Inches, William E. Metzger and Charles F. Reddon. They expect to follow the Hudson river and Canadian lakes and streams to Hudson Bay, where they will establish headquarters and try for polar bears and walrus. They expect to make the trip in three days.

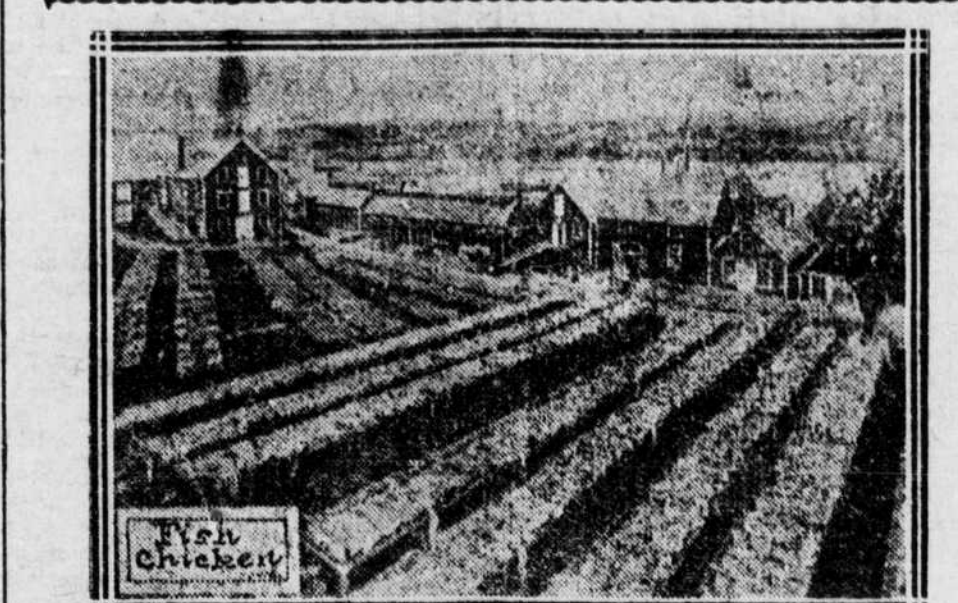
CUNO NEAR DISCOURAGED AT TASK IN GERMANY

Berlin, Nov. 20 (A. P.)—Nearly a week has passed since the cabinet of Chancellor Wirth resigned and the ministerial crisis is considered still far from settled. When Herr Cuno accepted the task of constituting a new cabinet of work, as he described it, it was hoped he would have all the port-folios, or at least the most of them, filled by today, but much difficulty has developed that it is believed likely he may even abandon the effort altogether.

WOULD PROVIDE MORE MONEY FOR FARMERS

Washington, Nov. 20.—An amendment to the federal farm loan act which would authorize the government to issue loans up to \$10,000 for development projects and \$25,000 for land purchases was introduced in the House today by Representative McLaughlin, republican, Nebraska. The amendment also would prevent the farm loan board from making advances in any amount under \$100.

WON'T NAME FORD FOR SENATORSHIP

Gov. Groesbeck Also Eliminates Detroit Mayor as Successor to Senator Newberry.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 20.—Henry Ford will not succeed Truman H. Newberry as United States Senator from Michigan.

This was announced definitely today by Gov. Alex. J. Groesbeck, who expects "within a few days" to name a successor to Newberry, who resigned Sunday.

Other than to say that neither Ford nor James Couzens, mayor of Detroit, would be the appointee, Governor Groesbeck refused to give an inkling of who the appointee would be. Politicians claiming to be in close touch with the governor, had narrowed the field of prospective appointees to three men, William W. Potter, state fuel administrator for the state of Michigan; Justice Grant Fellows and Marton Leroy Burton, president of the University of Michigan.

Henry Ford is traveling "on business." Officials of the Ford Motor Co. said they were convinced Ford was not devoting much thought to the possibility of his being appointed.

BEFORE SENATE TUESDAY. Washington, Nov. 20.—Truman H. Newberry's resignation as Senator from Michigan will be laid before the Senate probably tomorrow.

Technically, Newberry is still a member of the Senate, because the Senate has not been officially advised that he has resigned. Hence his name still appears on the roll and was called today on the roll call to determine whether a quorum was present.

WORLD LEAGUE IS ONLY PEACE HOPE

League of Nations Step in Right Direction, Says, But Needs U. S. Leadership.

Chicago, Nov. 20 (A. P.)—The only solution which will lead to world peace in an international conference against war, under which an offender would be dealt with like any other rioter, Maj. Gen. John F. O'Ryan declared today in an address on "The Maintenance of World Peace" before the Southern Commercial Congress.

NOVELIST FOUND DEAD. Los Angeles, Nov. 20 (U. P.)—George Bronson Howard, playwright and novelist, was found dead in a gas filled room in his bachelor apartments here today. The police said they believed it to be a case of suicide.

IOWA W. C. T. U. WINS MEMBERSHIP BANNER

Philadelphia, Nov. 20 (A. P.)—Iowa's W. C. T. U. organization was awarded the Frances Willard banner for the largest increase in membership during the last year at the national convention of the W. C. T. U. here.

DANCER DENOUNCES ACTION OF MAYOR

Indianapolis, Nov. 19.—Isadora Duncan, premiere danseuse, whose esthetic interpretations were given at the Murat theater here Saturday night under the critical surveillance of four policemen, was on the verge of a nervous collapse today.

WAR DECLARED BY DE VALERA

Leader of Insurgents Repudiates British Treaty and Calls Free Staters "Rebels."

Dublin, Nov. 20.—In a communication to "Universal Service" tonight Eamonn De Valera repudiated the treaty between British and Irish delegates. The principal reason given is that the treaty was signed under duress and therefore could not be binding on the Irish republic.

De Valera declares that the supporters and adherents of the provisional government are guilty of rebellion, and that the government is an illegal body.

The sum and substance of the communication is a declaration of war on every free state soldier, armed or otherwise, and that every member of the staff, including the labor members is liable to seizure and death by a firing squad.

TROOPS WILL REMAIN. London, Nov. 21 (2:50 a. m.)—The London Daily Mail this morning declares that the cabinet has decided that it is impossible to evacuate the British troops from Ireland for the present.

"Windmill Dance" Recommended as Figure Developer

Paris, Nov. 20.—The "windmill dance" is the latest thing to take Paris by storm. It was today advocated by Dr. Paul Lenard as "the best exercise ever invented for the development of the female figure."

UNDECIDED ON PACKER MERGER, SAYS WALLACE

Washington, Nov. 20.—President Harding and Secretary of Agriculture Wallace conferred at the White House tonight relative to the projected merger of the J. Ogden Armour and Nelson Morris stock yards interests.

CONFESSES TO GIGANTIC COUNTERFEITING SCHEME

San Francisco, Nov. 18 (A. P.)—Ivan Glavodovic, in a confession which secret service agents here today said he had made, told of an alleged counterfeiting plot whereby \$500,000 in bogus Bank of England notes, made by a photographic process, were to have been placed on the market.

SULTAN REACHES MALTA ON BRITISH BATTLESHIP

Malta, Nov. 20 (A. P.)—The British dreadnaught Malaya with Sultan Mohammed VI on board, arrived here this morning.

'TIGER' AND 'JACK' CHAT HALF HOUR

Clemenceau Receives General Pershing and Other Callers —Guest Sunday of Otto H. Kahn—At Roosevelt Grave.

New York, Nov. 19.—Georges Clemenceau, the "tiger" of France, today spent an active Sabbath, the first of his American visit. He arose at 6 o'clock this morning after a comfortable night's rest at the home of Charles Dana Gibson, the artist.

After a simple breakfast he rested until the arrival of Gen. John J. Pershing at 10 o'clock. The two men chatted for about 30 minutes until General Pershing left the Gibson home.

HARDING PROGRAM FACES OPPOSITION

Independents in Senate Prepared to Fight Subsidy at Session Opening Today.

Washington, Nov. 19.—For the first time in the life of the Harding administration, the president and his advisers face a bitter fight in both Senate and House as congress prepared tonight to assemble at noon tomorrow in extra session, convened by the executive to consider the ship subsidy bill.

On the issue of the subsidy alone, the president is virtually fighting with his back to the wall against a recalcitrant minority in the House and against the group of independents led by La Follette, Borah, Capper and Norris in the Senate.

The growth of the independent movement as a result of the recent election is certain to provide considerable embarrassment to the success of any legislation favored by the administration leaders.

Retires at 8 o'clock. Obeying a rule of a lifetime, Clemenceau retired at 8 o'clock last night after a strenuous day, which included his reception, a parade, a visit to the Metropolitan Opera House and a tour of the American Museum of Natural History.

In the afternoon he refused to carry out his prearranged program of remaining quiet. After luncheon he discussed politics for a long time with Col. House, and then decided that he would like to visit the hall of masterpieces in the museum of natural history, containing so many specimens in which his old friend, Col. Roosevelt, was interested.

On one of the floors a portrait of Humboldt, the German naturalist and scientist was pointed out.

Few of the many people in the museum recognized the former premier of France, and he plodded around tapping his cane on the floor.

SPEEDING AUTO HITS TREE; THREE KILLED

Stamford, Conn., Nov. 19.—Three men were instantly killed and two others fatally injured here today when a touring car, owned and driven by Rudolf Sylvester, owner of a restaurant, of Stamford, crashed into a tree at Bedford and Oak streets.

RECOMMEND WAGE BOOST. San Francisco, Nov. 18 (A. P.)—An increase of \$1 a day in the wages of bricklayers was recommended by the San Francisco Builders' Exchange, an organization of employers today at the opening of hearings before the wage board named by the industrial association to fix a 1923 wage scale for the building trades here. The present wage of bricklayers is \$9 a day.
