Hemp production in 1922 exceeded that of 1921 by 500,000 bales. The harvest was 1,200,088 bales of 270 pounds each.

Harding Refuses to Aid Borah's Idaho Opponents

President Frowns On Scheme Of G. O. P. Politicians To Eliminate Senator From Party

Butte, Mont., June 29.—Efforts to get President Harding to lend his active support to the fight on Senator Borah fell through when the president turned down the pleas of Idaho politicians that he rebuke Borah while speaking in Idaho.
Borah is fighting the whole republican organization of his state for his political life. One group of party organization leaders is so embittered against him that its members want to throw him out of the nominating convention, refuse to seat Borah delegates and repudiate him in the most ruthless manner.

Another group, quite as hostile but afraid of a third party movement, will try to beat Borah for the senatorial nomination without giving him a chance for a comeback.
Friends Favor Independence
Borah's friends would not be sorry to see him excluded from the convention. The plain fact is they—and Borah shares their feelings to a degree—would just as soon he run as an independent.
If his re-election were left to the people of Idaho, Borah would probably make little or no campaign, but would go right back to Washington and let the voters take care of him.
The only thing that deters the party leaders from reading Borah out of the party right now is the ominous shadow of an independent movement that might, they fear, cost the party the state in the 1924 campaign. It would take very little to crystallize third party sentiment, not only in Idaho, but throughout the

west, competent political observers in this section say.
Movement Might Spread
Thus, more than Idaho is involved. The whole western country that holds the balance of power now more securely than ever might be swung if Idaho politicians went through with their plan to cast Borah out.
National party headquarters in Washington have been keeping a close watch on the situation and it is likely that the strategy employed in the nominating convention will be directed from Washington.
President Harding wouldn't even let the Idaho politicians talk to him about it when they tried to enlist his aid. Mr. Harding has already made it plain that he wants no schism in the party. Besides that, he is now counting on Borah's help eventually in getting the world court proposal through the Senate. Mr. Harding understands how potent that assistance can be.

G. O. P Leaders Take Steps To Line Up Women for 1924

On Board President Harding's Train, July 1.—The women of the country will be appealed to by administration political leaders and campaign managers to act as a stabilizing force in keeping their men from bolting to a third party.
Party experts have been studying the political mind of the women, as manifested in the last congressional election and in local and state elections. They believe they have discovered that women are more conservative than men and are likely to answer the appeals now being made from various quarters to desert the old parties.

law, but affecting other phases of the "woman question." This legislation, which probably will be suggested to congress at the coming session by Mr. Harding, will include measures for better protection of women wage workers and will be intended as a means of stimulating state and local legislation of a more specific and detailed sort, to carry into effect principles to be laid down nationally in the federal legislation. It will be intended to carry out a thought voiced by President Harding in his Helena, Mont., speech, when he said that because of changed economic conditions, the nation must recognize the fact that some women must be wage earners if they are to have the opportunity of a home and children.

Concessions to Women
Two steps will be taken to accentuate this tendency among the women, not only to remain in the party themselves, but also to influence the men of their families to remain loyal. These are:
1. Full representation of women on the republican national committee and the party councils. This step already has been started, with President Harding's full approval.
2. Legislation for women and children, along the lines of the maternity

Would Provide Protection
These women should be surrounded by such safeguards that they will be able, while helping to maintain the home by their earnings, to give their children proper care, Mr. Harding feels.
These two steps, party strategists believe, will offset the political movement now under way to separate the women into a party of their own. The women would rather affiliate themselves with one of the existing parties, republican leaders believe.

TROUBLE LIKELY IN MARRIAGE DIVORCEES

Person Who Makes Failure Once Probably Will Again, Judge Says

Cleveland—If you marry a divorcee person, the chances are your matrimonial bark will hit the rocks, according to Judge George S. Addams, of the Cleveland Juvenile Court. Judge Addams has passed upon thousands of cases of conjugal infidelity in his years on the bench.
"If a woman can't live with one man, she isn't going to make a success of married life with another in most cases," Judge Addams said.
"Of course, in cases where the husband deserts his wife for no legitimate reason, the rule doesn't apply, but most divorces are the result of petty quarrels in the home.
"The rule applies to men as well as women. The practice of jumping from one mate to another immediately after the divorce decree is granted is growing more common and is disastrous to the American home.
"Names on our divorce docket are duplicated not once but many times. I always ask whether the contracting parties in a divorce suit have been married before, and the number who have is astonishing."

POURS BUCKET GASOLINE ON FIRE, TOWN VANISHES

Beaumont, Tex., July 1.—When pressing machine in tailor's shop blazed up suddenly an employe picked up a bucket of gasoline, believing it to be water, poured the contents on the machine, and started a fire which eventually wiped out Orangefield, a village in the Orange oil field near here Saturday. Thirteen buildings were consumed. The loss is estimated at \$50,000. First reports that an oil well was afire were incorrect.

VETAN EDUCATOR DIES IN ELK POINT

Elk Point, S. D., July 1.—H. E. French, 72 years old, who died last Friday, was buried here today. He was born at Maquoketa, Ia., in 1851. In 1856 the family moved to Minnesota, but returned to Iowa the same year, owing to Indian trouble. He was city superintendent of schools of Sabel, Iowa; Pipestone, Minn., and of Elk Point for nine and half years before resigning to become county superintendent, for four years. He is survived by his widow and one child.

STATE FINISHES IN HIGGIBOTHAM CASE

Lake City, Fla., June 29.—The state closed its case in the trial of Thomas W. Higginbotham, convict whipping boss on trial for the murder of Mattin Tabert of North Dakota, last Friday after Dr. E. F. Brown concluded his expert testimony. The defense was arranging to call its first witness when court ordered a short recess.

HUNT GANG OF SIX IN BIG STOCK FRAUD

San Francisco, July 1.—Search for six alleged "get-rich-quick" brokers, who have been indicted in connection with a series of stock frauds, which culminated in the closing of one bank is being made today by police. Depredations of the gang which are characterized as the most spectacular stock frauds in the state's history may reach the figure of \$1,000,000, it is said.

COAL OPERATORS READY TO FIGHT

Miners' Demand for 20 Per Cent Increase Believed To Be Merely Basis for Opening Negotiations

Washington, July 1.—Vigorous opposition to the demands of the anthracite miners for a 20 per cent wage increase and a two-year contract will be made by the operators at their joint meeting in Atlantic City this week, according to information reaching the United States Coal commission.
Those who are in close touch with the coal situation explained that it is the practice of the mine workers to fix a top figure in wage negotiations and use it for trading purposes when the operators and miners get around the conference table. The new demands of the miners did not come as a surprise to officials here and are not expected to bring on another suspension of mining through failure to negotiate a new wage scale with the operators.
When the wage scale committee of the miners and operators are convened, the report of the Coal commission on the anthracite industry will be available and is expected to have a great bearing in the negotiation of the new contract to replace the one expiring August 31. The commission has gathered a vast amount of data regarding mining costs, and this is expected to show whether the miners are justified in demanding a 20 per cent wage increase.
John Hays Hammond, chairman of the commission, and his associates are working at top speed to get out the anthracite report. They are convinced their findings will avert another disastrous coal strike.

HARDING VISITING BIG PARK TODAY

President's Time Divided Up On Crowded Schedule For Day—Next Speech At Spokane July 2, Plan

With President Harding in Yellowstone National Park, June 30.—President Harding and his Alaska board caravan today entered one of America's playgrounds. Turning aside from the beaten path of cheering crowds, speeches and hot pullman cars, the president came to Yellowstone park for a rest.
Even here, far from ordinary surroundings of life, the impossibility of having a real vacation while he is president was borne in on Mr. Harding. The retinue that attended him into the park this morning at Gardiner, Mont., was as numerous as the entourage of many an ancient king and there will be many witnesses at all times—even when he goes fishing.
The president, however, will make the best of his two day vacation in the park. Practically every minute of his time has been divided up by schedule, long in advance. Instead of just taking his rod and reel and fishing a stream in solitude and contentment, he will be allowed to fish just so long and then he must ride in an auto just so long, and see this and that natural wonder at a certain hour.
The president's next speaking date is Spokane, where he will arrive July 2.
