

thracite miners for a 20 per cent wage increase and a two-year contract will be made by the operators at their joint meeting in Atlantic City this week, according to information reaching the United States Coal commis-

Those who are in clse touch with the coal situation explained that it is the practice of the mine workers to fix a top figure in wage negotiations and use it for trading purposes when the operators and miners get around the conference table. The new demands of the miners did not come as a surprise to officials here and are not expected to bring on another suspension of mining through failure to negotiate a new wage scale with the operators.

When the wage scale committee of the miners and operatrs are convened, the report of the Coal commission on the anthracite industry will be available and is expected to have a great bearing in the negotiation of the new contract to replace the one expiring August 31. The commission has gathered a vast amount of data regarding mining cost,s and this is expected to show whether the miners are justified in demanding a 20 per cent wage increase.


