An ordinance providing rules and regulations for the use of vehicles upon the streets of The City of O'Neill, Nebraska, and providing regulations for the standing or parking of vehicles upon such streets; repealing ordinance No. 53a; providing penalties for violations of any of the provisions of this ordinance. of the provisions of this ordinance. Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of The City of O'Neill, Ne-

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for

following rules:

Rule 1. No vehicle shall be permitted to stand within ten feet of any mitted to stand within ten feet of any J. B. Donohoe street intersection, nor shall any vehicle be permitted to stand or be

parked in front of any alley.
Rule 2. All vehicles left standing between Clay and Fremont Streets on Fourth Street, shall be parked on the sides of said Fourth Street. Those on the west side of said street shall be parked so that they face the southwest at an angle of approximately 45 degrees. Rule 4. No vehicle shall be permitted to cease moving while in the center of said Fourth street between Clay and Fremont Streets, nor while in the enter of said Douglas Street between

Rule 5. All vehicles in motion must nove upon and along the right half of

Rule 6. In turning to the left from one street to another every vehicle shall pass to the right of and beyond he center of the crossing.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not less than John E. Donohoe Two Dollars nor more than Five Dollars for each offense and pay the costs of prosecution and shall stand com-

mitted to the city jail until the fine and costs are paid.

Section 3. That Ordinance No. 53a be, and the same hereby is repealed.
