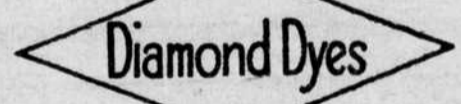

OPERA SINGERS TO TOUR NATION

Two Trains Will Carry Chicago Company and Equipment on Trip

Chicago.—Chicago's Civic Opera Company will blaze a trail of harmony for 10,000 miles at the close of the opera season in Chicago January 26 and in a period of eight weeks will present grand opera in 17 cities.

Two special trains will be required to carry the approximately 225 people and the equipment necessary for the presentations.

C. A. Shaw, manager of the tour, has completed arrangements for the appearances of the company in Boston, the first city on the itinerary, beginning January 28 and ending February 9.

Feodore Challapin will have the title role in "Doris Godunoff" and will appear, with Edith Mason, in "Metastosele".

Mrs. Claudia Muzio, dramatic soprano, will appear in Boston and Cleveland and, instead of continuing with the company, will go to Havana, Cuba, to fill an engagement and later to Mexico City.

15,000 Blinded by Industrial Accidents

New York.—Industrial accidents cause more blindness and eye injuries than any other single cause. Of a total of 100,000 blind persons in the United States, 15,000 became so through industrial accidents.

The National Committee for the prevention of blindness which is working for the elimination of blindness, eye injuries and eye diseases, both in industry and elsewhere, has just sent to press a comprehensive report on "Eye Hazards in Industrial Occupations."

Millionaire Now Owns Yacht Which Rescued Him

London.—There's a pleasant, little story, in the best vein of Horatio Alger, concealed behind the announcement that Sir Walter Runciman, head of the great shipping line, has left in his yacht "Sunbeam" for a cruise.

The yacht "Sunbeam" is the famous old yacht in which Lord and Lady Brassey made many years ago their famous cruise around the world. They wrote a book about it. They tell the story of how, when they were cruising off the River Plate in the '70's, they noticed a small English barque in distress.

Give Indians Fake Permits for Trading

Washington.—Secretary of the Interior Work has informed the treasury department of the fraudulent sale of trading permits to Indians of northern New York which purport to give them rights to trade across the United States and Canadian borders without payment of duties.

The fake permits bear the name of the assistant secretary of the treasury occupying that office in 1873, and are based on the treaty of amity, commerce and navigation concluded between this country and Great Britain in 1794.

To Limit Expanding Federalism One of Serious Fiscal Problems

From the Minneapolis Journal.

Bentley W. Warren, a prominent lawyer of Boston, writing in the Atlantic Monthly, points the enormous growth of Federal activity and power in these striking terms:

"Even before the citizen of a state can now be born, he and his prospective mother are subject to rules and regulations established by the Federal Bureau. After birth, the extent and method of his education will, under the Sterling-Towner bill, be fixed by a Federal Department of Education."

As one studies the steady drive toward federal centralization and control, the question naturally arises as to what will check it. The flood of laws is not likely soon to be diminished.

Mr. Warren does not undertake to say what will check it, but it seems likely that federal centralization will be eventually checked by the inability of the individual taxpayer to bear its costs.

Note how Federal expense mounts. In 1914 the Federal Trade Commission was allowed \$75,000. Eight years later its appropriation was \$995,000, or 13 times the initial amount.

The individual taxpayer bears the burden. It does not take much foresight to realize that the time will soon come when he can stand no more tax burdens. His very inability seems likely to be the economic force that will check federal centralization, and send us back to the more wholesome ways of individual self-help and care which early economists like Herbert Spencer and John Stuart Mill urged should not be lost or compromised.

Memel

In the old German Reich, Memel was farthest north; the spearpoint of that strip of Prussia, flat, desolate and cut by numerous arms of the sea, thrust between the Baltic and the Russia of 1914; in 1924 Russia, Poland and Lithuania are deeply concerned in its free port, its political fate being quite a separate question.
