**BUTTE COURT'S ACTION  
ANOTHER SIMMONS DEFEAT**

Judge Ford's Decision In Sustaining Objections of Attorney General Kills another Chance To Save The Alleged Slayer.

Butte, Neb., May 7.—Yesterday County Judge Robert Ford here yesterday sustained the objections of Attorney General Spillman to the habeas corpus proceedings in behalf of Walter R. Simmons, another chance to save Simmons' life or at least delay the execution is believed to have been lost. This leaves only seventeen days for Simmons to carry on the fight to avoid the electric chair, to which he was condemned for the murder of Frank Pahl of Spencer, Nebraska.

Attorneys for Simmons, when they filed the proceedings in the county court at Butte last week, it is believed, were endeavoring to pave the way to take Simmons' case to the United States supreme court. They claimed that Simmons' constitutional rights had been violated in that some of the jurors had expressed an opinion regarding the prisoner's guilt before being selected and that new evidence that by law would enable them to take the case to the highest tribunal had been found.

Judge Ford, allowed the writ and ordered Warden W. T. Fenton of the state prison to produce Simmons in the Boyd county court on May 8. The warden turned the order over to Attorney General Spillman for a ruling. The attorney general held that Judge Ford had no jurisdiction in the case and that the writ should be declared void in that the proceedings should have been instituted in the county in which the prisoner was held and that the county court had no jurisdiction over Fenton, a state officer.  
Assistant Attorney General Floyd Dort was sent here to fight the proceedings, resulting in the attorney general's opinions being upheld.

Lincoln, Neb., May 7. Attorney for Walter Ray Simmons, slayer of Frank Pahl, Spencer garage man, sentenced to die here on May 23, were undecided today on the next step in their fight to stave off the electrocution.

Yesterday the Boyd county court ruled that it had no jurisdiction over Warden Fenton of the state penitentiary at Lincoln and Attorney General Spillman said he considered the habeas corpus proceedings instituted there to be dropped.  
Two courses were considered possible by defense attorneys.

1—Obtain habeas corpus proceedings from the Lancaster county court.  
2—Apply to the state supreme court for a writ of habeas corpus and have depositions taken in Boyd county on the question of whether Simmons had a fair trial.

Habeas corpus proceedings involve a civil and not criminal action and only the legality of the case can be considered by the courts.

Judge E. P. Holmes, counsel for Simmons, said today he had received no official word from Butte and was awaiting a definite decision from the court before deciding on the move.
