Many Birds Named From Their Songs

Some birds, as the whippoorwill, the phoebe and the bobolink get their names from their songs, which are supposed to resemble the words, says the Kansas City Star.
The name of the grackle comes from its cry, "Gra, gra," by way of a Latin word. Pigeon comes from the Latin pipere, to peep or chirp.
Robin is supposed to be an abbreviation of Robert, which name is from the old High German language and means "bright in face."
Petrel is a diminutive of Peter. The petrel skims the surface of lakes and the sea, near which it makes its home. The name is believed to have reference to St. Peter's walking on the water. The stormy petrel, supposed to foretell storms, is the bird known as "Mother Carey's chicken."
The missel-bird, largest of the European thrush family, is so named on account of its partiality for a diet of mistletoe berry. The word comes from the German, mistel, meaning mistletoe. The missel-bird sings loudest just before a storm and is sometimes called the storm cock.
Orolo comes by way of the French from the Latin aureolus, diminutive of aurum, gold, so called because of its bright plumage.
Finch is an old Anglo-Saxon word and means brisk, smart or gay, words which well describe the birds which bear that cognomen. The grosbeaks, which are allied to the finches, are so called because their bills are gross, that is, thick.
The kingfisher is a king among fishing birds, and so is called after the mastery way in which it obtains its prey.
Snipe comes from the German and means a bill, or beak, in reference to the long bill of the bird.
Dove is from the Anglo-Saxon and means to dive. Duck comes from the fowl's habit of ducking under water. The gadwall duck gets about easily; it "gads" well.
The pheasant derives its name from the Phasis, a river in Asia Minor. The guinea fowls of the farnyard get their name from Guinea, in Africa, whence they originally came. Turkeys, natives of America, were erroneously supposed to have come from Turkey, and were so called.
