Mount Athos' Famous Monastery Destroyed

The famous monastery of Chilandarl, on Mount Athos, built in the Middle ages, has been destroyed by fire. Mount Athos, the "Holy Mountain," gives its name to the northernmost of those peninsulas which extend like a three-pronged fork from Greece into the Aegean sea. It contains several monasteries and hermitages standing amid magnificent scenery. Access to some of the monasteries overlooking the sea is so difficult that visitors have been drawn up in a sack-shaped contrivance operated by rope. Chilandari monastery is famous for a most valuable MS. of the Gospels in gold letters on white vellum, probably given by the Emperor Andronicus Comnenus about 1184, and a treasure chest containing valu able specimens of Serbian ecclesiastical art. In 1916 Chilandari was raided by Bulgarian monks from the neighboring monastery of Zographon.
