In naming prominent leaders to work in conjunction with Legion officials, Governor McMullen declared Nebraskans want to see "this job done promptly and effectively."

General Pershing also has made an appeal to every community of Nebraska to aid in carrying the endowment fund to success.

"Nebraska's part in this campaign will, I hope, be taken up in the same fine spirit that was manifest in the various drives during the war," General Pershing said. "Then the state stood high in her per capita subscrip-

tion toward winning the war. "We face no less responsibility today," he continued, "in taking care of the 35,000 or more orphans of exservice men and in helping the men who came back maimed for life.


