"The George And The Crown" By Sheila Kaye-Smith

(E. P. Dutton & Company, \$2) Just as De Wolfe Hopper alwill be identified with "Casey at the Bat" and John Hayes with "Jim Bludsoe," regardless of any later expressions of their talents, so always will Sheila Kay-Smith be identified in my mind with "Joanna Godden." That was a book, which now, after several years, I remember in most accurate detail, and which for months I found repeatedly in my thought and conversation. Joanna herself, will always be a living person vigorous and unique, and unforgettable. With memories of Jeanna keen in my mind, "The End of the House of Alard," was a jolting letdown, so pallid fumbling in comparison with the earlier book. Now, in "The George and The Crown" there is a swing back to the sturdy strength of "Joanna Godden," though the story does not have, to my mind, the emotional intensity of that book, nor any character to compare with

Joanna.

The author has a power reminiscent of Thomas Hardy, in her depiction of simple, rustic folk. She tells of Dan, unlettered, crude, but so soundly good as to reach nobility, and she makes his problems universally significant. She writes close to the soil, and achieves a fundamental solidity, that is completely diverced from the frittering inconsequence of many of the questions brought up with such solemnity in our fiction of the day. Dan's problems were of fidelity. love and fatherhood. The simple democracy of his relation to Ernley. and the rector rather gives the lie to the idea of the strict caste system which we, in this land of the free, believe prevails in England. This book is worth 10 at least of the books depicting "smart" society, and the clever repartee bandled about by the sophisticated.
