

One of the reasons which has persuaded the American Federation of Labor to renounce future official indorsements of third party political movements is confirmation by its leaders, in the last campaign, of the rather curious fact that a body of men organized for one purpose can not be diverted to another purpose. This limitation is known to all men who organize and yet they are continually forgetting it. The men with the most highly developed sense of organization are the politicians. Their prosperity is grounded in keeping an organization grouped around the generality of a party name and they know it. Any departure, however slight, from that generality is not regarded by them as safe. Time after time they are under the necessity of departing from it by extolling to the heavens some single person, the party nominee, but the minute they detect that the person extolled believes himself to be stronger than his party, then the politicians begin back-pedalling in their praise of him. This was one of the chief causes of the memorable revolt of the republican politicians against Theodore Roosevelt. Organizations not primarily political can be controlled measurably and for a short time for political purposes. But when the primary purpose of the organization is permanently subordinated to a personal, a political or any other aim, the organization begins to dissipate. The leaders of the American Federation of Labor, who are past masters in the art of organization, therefore decided that the action of the federation in the national campaign of 1924 shall go down in history as a mere temporary excursion, and not a practice.



Thousands of flowers and plants of southeastern areas of the United States have recently been added to the collections of the New York botanical garden in Bronx park. These specimens were gathered by Dr. John K. Small, head curator of the garden's museum, in a 7,000-mile exploration. They included about 5,000 dried plants mostly of the flowering varieties, and hundreds of living plants, representing such groups as the spider lily, the irls and the orchid, as well as many other little known types from various critical groups now being studied by the garden's botanists.
