Local Cream Station Manager Arrested

(Plainview News, April 25th) H. L. Davis, local manager of the Omaha Cold Storage Cream Station in Plainview, stood trial in Judge Hall's court last Thursday, when a state inspector produced evidence that the Omaha Cold Storage Station had been paying more than the advertised price for cream, which is a discrimination against the laws of our state. Mr. Davis plead guilty and was given a fine of \$100.00 and costs. Tom Hagedorn and Mr. Davis went to Pierce, Saturday, where a representative of the company from Norfolk paid the fine. The state employs special inspectors to keep tabs on the cream stations and when this case was reported to him he came up and brought the matter to a head. This is just another case of the old line companies fighting the local, independent creameries.

The Farmers Union will meet any local competition and believes in one price to all and we post our price in the window at all times. Any time you show us that other stations are paying more, we will meet their price. Price.
