The law does not allow Free High School Tuition certificates to be issued for the ninth grade for any pupil who has not taken the State Eighth Grade examinations.

A transfer into a city school district from a rural district, by the new law will transfer the High School pupils as well as the grade pupils of the transferred family. No Free High School tuition certificate will be issued to the High School pupils of families transferred into a High School district.

According to the new Compulsory

Education law, no district may hold less than a seven month term of school.
