Mr. Earl was found by four young men from Elgin, who were out hunting. A chorus of fifty dancing girls is seen in the musical comedy scenes with Miss White and the splendid Louis Silvers, provided the music.


The story is adapted from Jay Gelzer's novelette "Broadway Musketeers," and tells the experiences of three little dancing girls on the Great White Way.
