RESOLUTION

Whereas, a controversy has heretofore existed between the County of Holt and the Northern Nebraska Power Company, growing out of the matter of construction of a road on the south bank of the Niobrara river just south of the present reservoir of the Northern Nebraska Power Co. and the vacation of a former public road along the bottom and across land

that is covered by the reservoir of said Company,

And whereas, the said Northern Nebraska Power Company has now submitted to this honorable body a proposition of settlement by paying to the County of Holt the sum of \$500 for a release and satisfaction of all liability and claims which the county has, or asserts, against said Company in connection with said matter.

Now, therefore, Mr. Chairman, I move you that said proposition be, and the same hereby is accepted and that the chairman of this board be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to execute a release and satisfaction of said claim in consideration of the payment of said \$500 into the County Treasurer by the said power company.

RESOLUTION

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Holt County, Nebraska:

You are hereby notified that the natural flow and drain from sections 33, 34, 27 and 26 in Township 30, Range 15, is from the southwest to the northeast and that there is a natural depression and stream of water that flows through sections 33 and 34 and 27 and 26 and that said stream empties into the Elkhorn river in said section 26, in the township and range aforesaid. That there is a regular highway running between sections 27 and 34 in the aforesaid range and township and running east and west of said sections 27 and 34 and that said stream and drain of said water from the southwest to the northeast and which empties into the Elkhorn river in section 26, crosses said highway from section 34 to section 27 in the aforesaid township and range and on said highway at the point where said water flows and crosses Holt County had built and established a bridge so as to permit the water to follow its natural course and drain.

That the water flowing in its natural way and across said section line and through and under said bridge carried with it, with the spring freshets and rain, sediment that accumulated under the bridge and constantly kept accumulating until it filled up under the said bridge so high that it will not permit the water to follow its natural course and the township have dug a ditch along the south line of the highway east and west and along the side of said bridge deeper than the natural drain and that they, by reason thereof and by reason of the filling up of the drain and space under the bridge, it car-

ries the water to the east along the south side of said highway and in large, unusual and great quantities and said ditch is not sufficient to take the water and it leaves said ditch and flows to the south over a large portion of sections 34 and 35 and on the land of Paul Dohman and Adam Dohman and Walter Callens and others and greatly injures and seriously damages between 160 and 200 acres of valuable farm and meadow land.

That if said drain was cleaned out from under said bridge and said ditch and said ditch on the south side of said highway filled up to the natural level of the water bed before it was distorted all of said water would pass through and under said bridge in the natural course of said drainage and none of said water would go east on the south side of the highway that runs east between sections 27, 34, 26 and 35, township 30, range 15, in this county, and we respectfully request this honorable body to take immediate action to remove and cause to be removed all dirt and refuse that has accumulated under said bridge and which prevents said bridge from functioning as a bridge and drain to the great damage of the undersigned persons and that the ditch along said highway be so arranged and adjusted so as to permit and cause said water to flow in its natural course under said bridge instead of to the east along the south side of said highway; that in the flow in its natural course it
