The McKnight strippers are pulled by Ford cars converted into power trucks with iron drive wheels; two strippers are attached to each truck. The companies pay \$1.00 per acre and up for the privilege of taking the seed. The grass is not injured in the process of removing the seed.

The seed must be removed when it is ready; the weather condition must be perfect if the work can be carried on for more than ten days.
