Chas E Friends Weaver piled up a majority of 1065 Chas. E. Erickson T. W. Bass over Harry O. Palmer of Omaha in Fred C. Ericson the gubernatorial contest.

The contest for representative in the sixty-fourth district developed into a real contest between Fars into a real contest between Ezra Cooke and C. E. Havens; when the votes were all in with the exception of the vote by mail ballots, it was Richard F. Wood found that Cooke was in the lead one vote. Havens has a majority of 3 Wilber E. In the family name contests on the Republican ticket for secretary and auditor, the Marsh famof state and auditor, the Marsh family was 100 per cent victorious over the Johnson boys.

Frank Marsh easily defeated his Johnson in the race for secretary of state and George Marsh took down two Johnsons in the race for auditor. The other Johnson was Fred G., former secretary to Governor Weaver. The expedition of the Ericsons for
