

Take two envelopes, place them together, one upside down with its back to the face of the other. Let the flap of one envelope overlap the back of the other, so that both flaps are on the back of one envelope. Then carefully paste the envelopes together, smoothing the edges so they appear as one. Now take two identical cards from a pinochle deck, place one in one of the envelopes, which is then sealed and a tiny identification mark placed upon it. Put the other card on top of the pack, and appear before your audience. 


