

Positive Proof of FORD ECONOMY

City of Detroit purchases 137 new Ford cars

THESE 137 new Ford cars represent one of the largest deliveries ever made to a municipality at one time.

21 radio-equipped Ford scout cars were traded in on this purchase. They had been operated day and night for two years in heavy traffic and all kinds of weather.

Their individual records ranged from 73,434 miles to 143,723 miles with a grand total of 2,283,097 miles. The operating cost of the 21 cars was 2.264 cents a mile — less than 2 1/3 cents. This cost included all fuel, oil, tires, repairs and every other item except depreciation and insurance.

Of 577 Ford cars in Detroit City service, the 300 in the Police Department traveled a total of 6,591,937 miles during the past fiscal year, at an average cost of 2.9 cents a mile.

Judge Upholds First Mortgages In Case of National Importance

In a Superior Court decision in Chicago Judge Marcus A. Kavanagh has upheld the prior rights of first mortgage holders and refused to name a receiver for one of the buildings included in the George M. Forman Realty Trust. Judge Kavanagh, widely known jurist, asserted that the Trust's operator of the structure was much more efficient and economical than it could be under a receivership.

Small investors throughout the country were directly interested in the decision. They held bonds of the Trust covering twenty-nine buildings which would have been affected by an adverse decision. The judge's ruling cleared the way for continued operation of the structures under methods proved successful in the Trust's



first year. Practically \$13,000,000 of deposited and controlled bonds are in the hands of the Trust which is managing the interests of large apartment and hotel buildings for the benefit of many thousands of small investors.

William G. Lodwick, of Chicago, president, and Porter Fox, vice-president of the Trust, recently were in conference with financial leaders of the East regarding adoption of the Trust's methods in other large cities.

The prospectus was prepared by the Baldwin Company of Hebron, with whom the society has a contract for preparation of the new biographical history. Mr. Clark asserted that he was highly pleased with the material included in the prospectus, as well as with the full page photographs and general make-up of the advance copy.

"Of course it will be several months before the editors can finish the task of preparing biographies for Nebraskans' leaders," said Mr. Clark. "Questionnaires are being mailed to persons selected to appear in the history as fast as the eligibility committee passes on them. Each person so honored is made a life member of the society. We believe our association is doing a worthy work and the co-operation we are receiving in Holt county is appreciated."
