

THREAD SUPPORTING RING CAN BE BURNED AND STILL SUPPORT RING



A piece of thread must be prepared for this trick in the following manner: A small glass is filled with water, two teaspoonfuls of salt are added and the water is stirred until the salt has dissolved. The thread is dropped into the water, left to soak for about an hour, and taken out and thoroughly dried. The performer appears before the audience, borrows a ring, and ties one end of the thread to the ring, which is then held suspended in mid-air, and a match is applied to the thread. Although the thread burns, it will retain sufficient strength to hold the ring. This is explained by the saltwater forming a crystallized surface on the thread, which gives it double strength.

TRICK OF SWALLOWING A KNIFE IS DESCRIBED



Take an ordinary table knife or a ruler and stand in front of the audience. Open the mouth wide and place right hand over tower portion, as though to keep the mouth open. Then with the left hand shove the knife down the right sleeve and immediately withdraw it. With the mouth partly hidden by the right hand, it appears to the onlookers that the knife is actually being swallewed.
