LONG PINE WILL RECEIVE

To develop a new source of water supply at the city of Long Pine, Nebr., the Reconstruction Finance Corporation will purchase \$15,000 worth of 51/2 per cent bonds, to make the de-

velopment possible. It is estimated that forty men will be employed on the project for sixty days on a 30 hour week basis and about \$9,000 worth of material will be used. The project will consist of a concrete reservoir to collect water from springs, a pumping plant and a pipe line 2,800 feet long.
