February 12, 1809 to April 14, 1865

INFLINCHINGLY he kept the helm while those he trusted best failed him. Farseeing, looked beyond the issues of the day; when others cried for conquest and subjection, he labored for the day that would see North and South united again. His goal achieved, he died on the threshold of his glory. But the lessons he taught us guide us today, and Abraham Lincoln belongs to all mankind. He was one of the worlds immortals.
