## AT THE STATE LEGISLATURE

The Nebraska state senate highway committee last Tuesday reported for J. C. PENNEY CO. passage, with admendments, senate file number 84. This bill was drawn for the purpose of abolishing the preference in the order in which state highways should be completed. As all the county seats have now been connected it is believed to be a proper step. The committee approved this part of the bill in part but added several new highways to the body of the bill and added nine new highways to the bottom of the present list of 204 state highways. Of the nine new highways added four are in this section of the state.

In place of the old preference clause in the bill the committee inserted this provision.

"Provided that this condition which gives preference to construction of highways shall not apply to those and state parks and county seats of adjoining counties."
