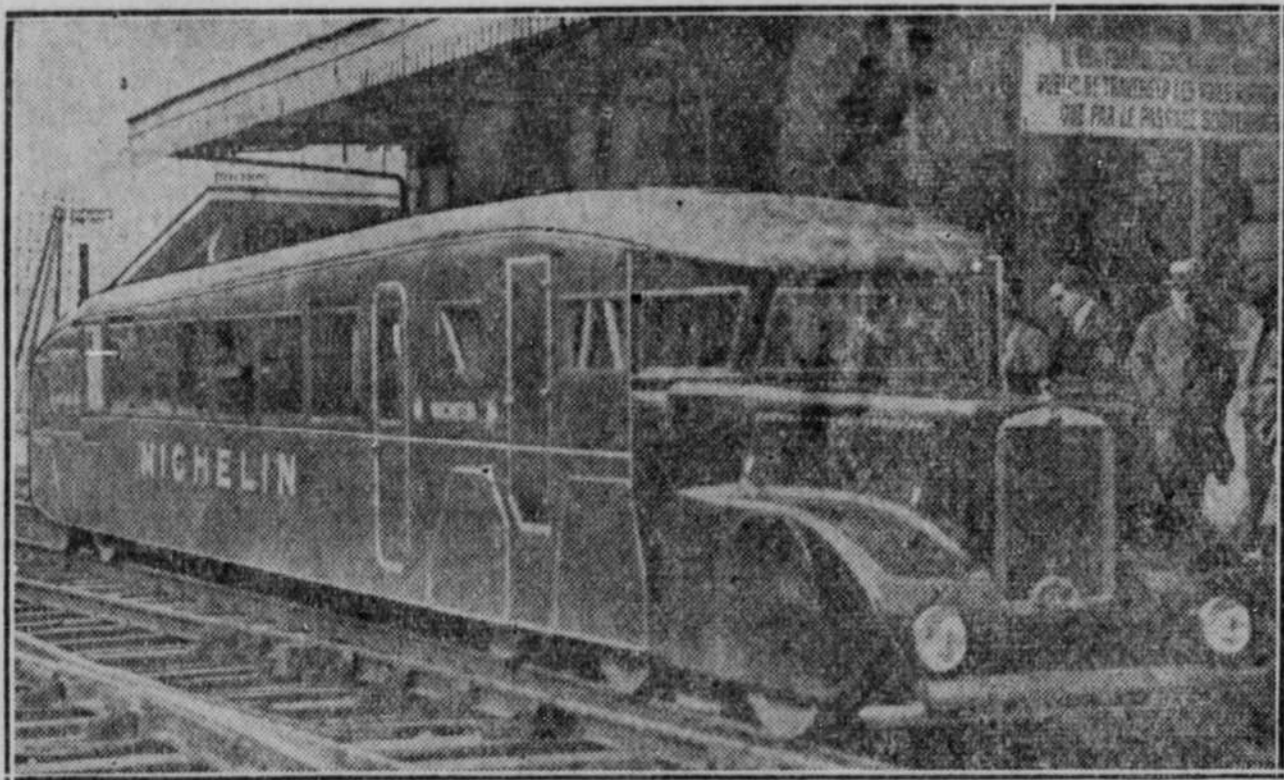


### Something New in Railroad Transportation



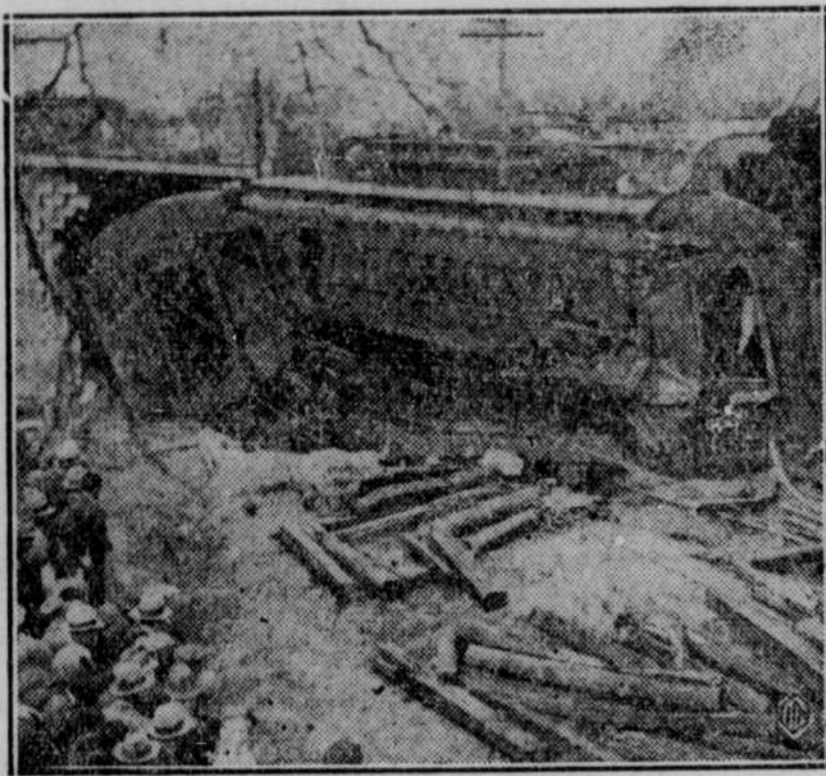

### Freed From Baron



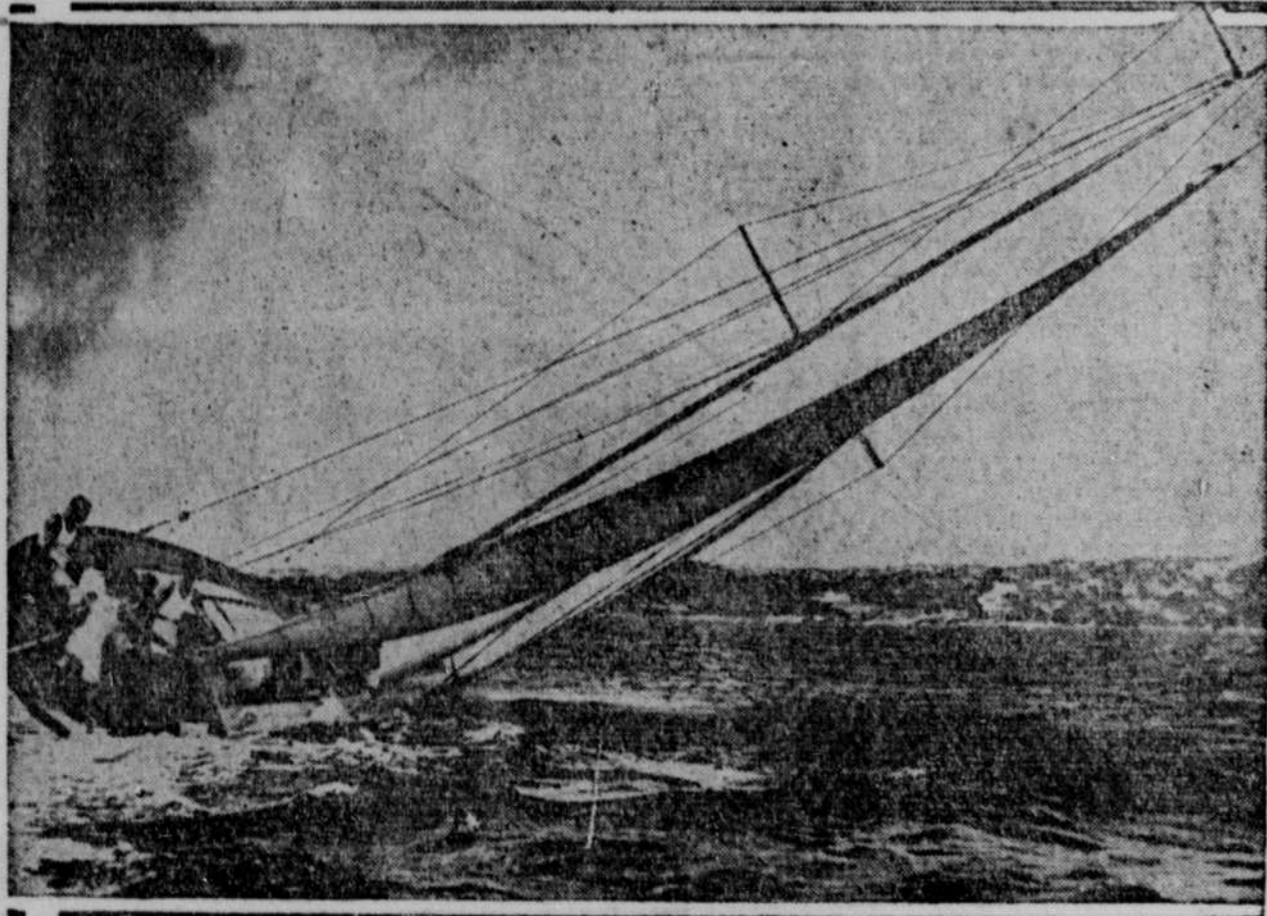

### Where Two Died in Train Wreck



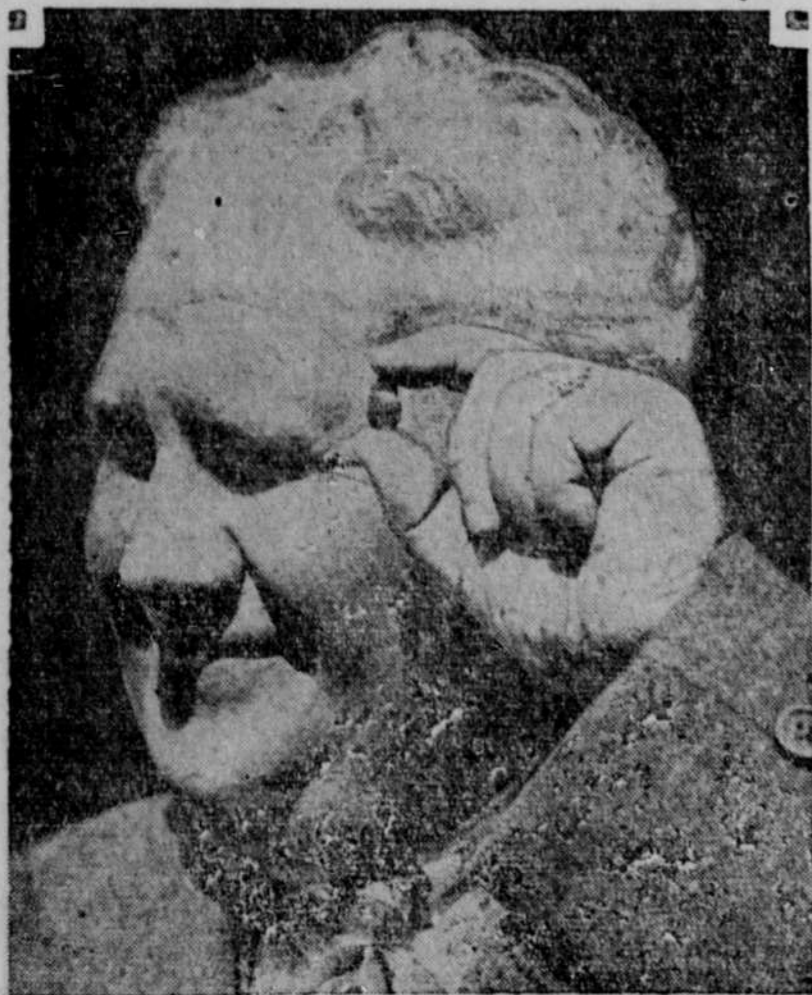

### Agrarian Expert



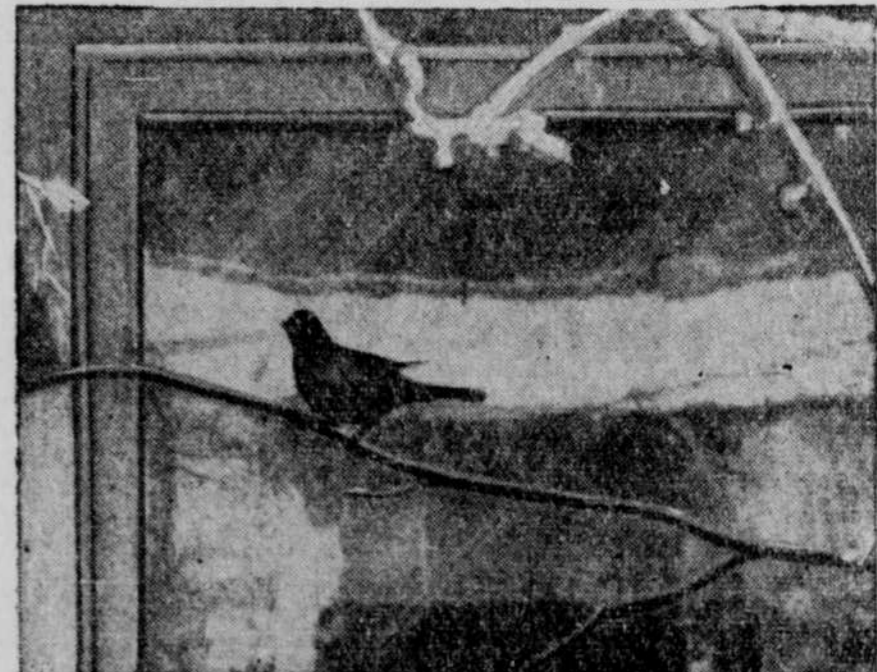
