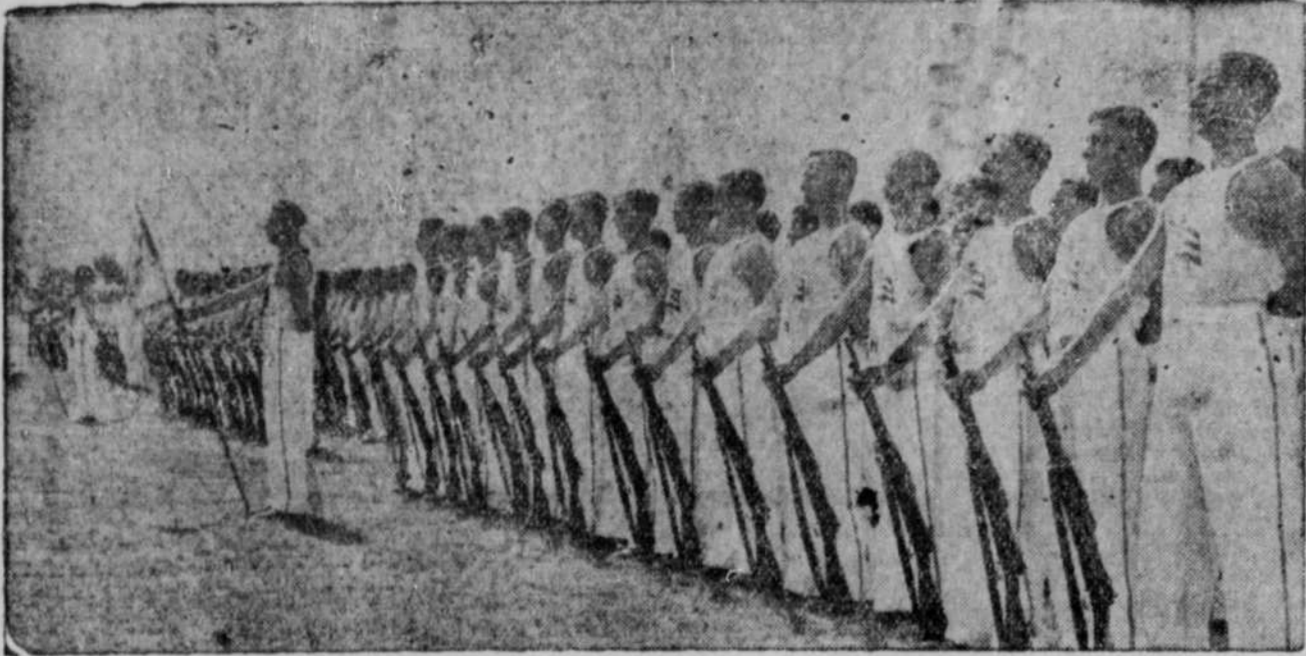


Ready to Protect Life and Property

Look Out, Europe!



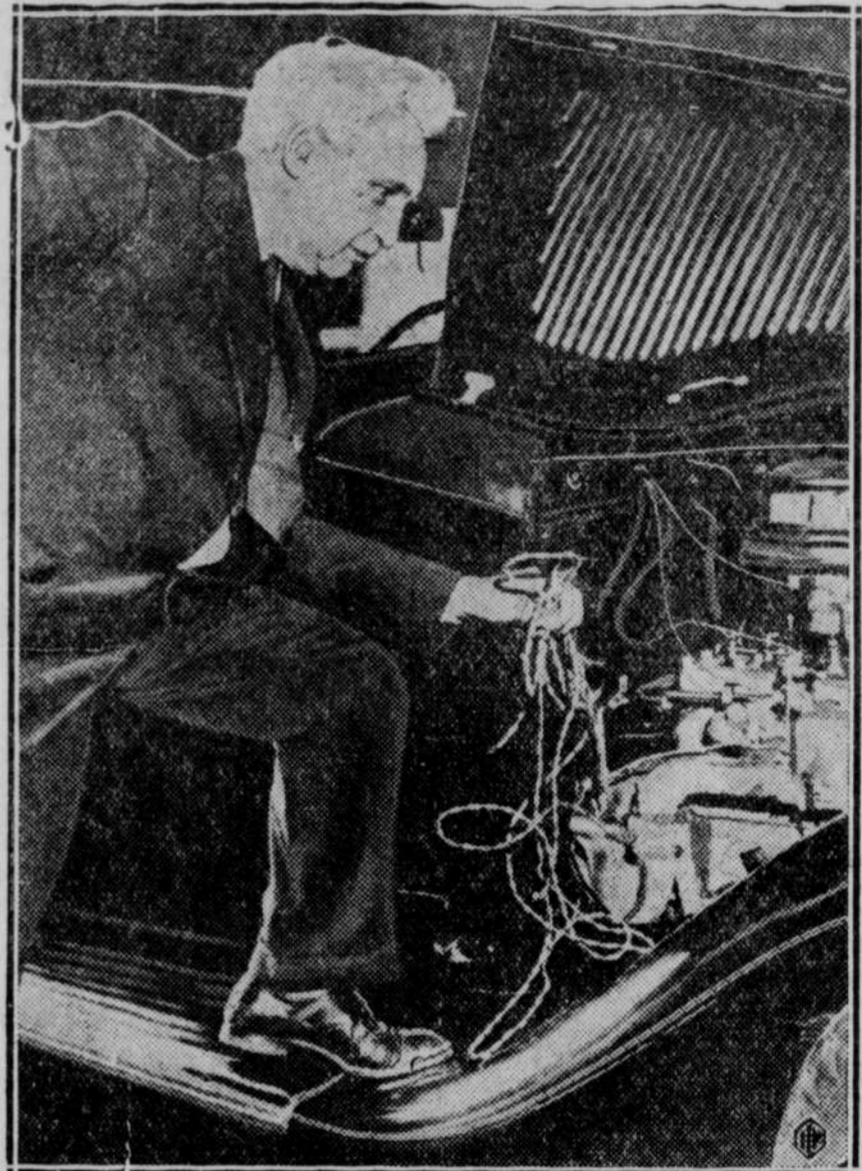

Surveying Spiked Bomb Trap



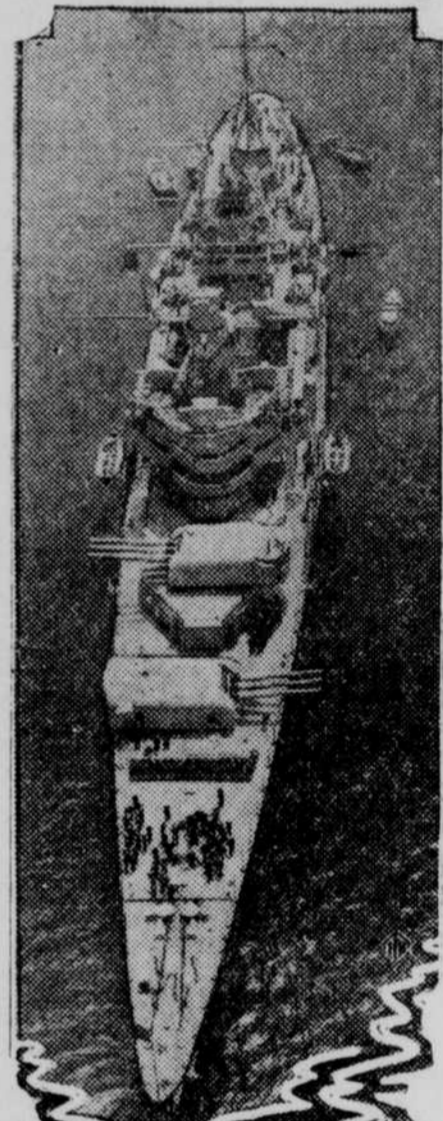
