

NEW FUNDS ALLOTED TO HOLT COUNTY FOR MORE CWA PROJECTS

O'Neill Street Projects Have Been Alloted An Additional \$600. Funds For Chambers.

According to Max Johnson, relief worker and payroll certification officer for Holt county, this is the second week of CWA operations under new classifications of unemployed men designed to give the men actually in need of work help. The new plan is working out in fine shape. All applications for work are passed on by Mr. Johnson.

During intensely cold weather there will be fewer jobs, but as soon as the weather permits the CWA program is to be pushed forward at top speed.

At this time there are about 600 jobs available in Holt county. In the county are 28 approved projects.

None call for more than 18 men, per shift, two shifts, employing about 36 men.

A new project is that of street work at Chambers, to consist of graveling and repairing.

The O'Neill street project has been alloted an additional \$600 to be used to repair the east-west street one
