NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the qualified voters of School District Number Thirty of Holt county, Nebraska, that by vote of two-thirds of the District Board of said School District, an election is hereby called and shall be held at the I. O. O. F. Hall, Downstairs, in Inman, in said School District Number Thirty, in the County of Holt, in the State of Nebraska, on the 4th day of May, A. D., 1935, between the hours of Eight o'clock A. M. and Six o'clock P. M., at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said School District the following proposition:

"Shall the District Board of Trustees of School District Number Thirty, in the County of Holt, in the State of Nebraska, issue the bonds of said School District in the amount of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00), bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed four per cent per annum, interest payable annually, Bonds to be retired in not to exceed twenty years, said Bonds to be dated July first, 1935, and

"Shall the District Board of Trustees of said School District cause to be levied annually against the taxable property of said School District a tax sufficient for the payment of the interest and principal of said Bonds, as the same become due, the proceeds of said Bonds, together with a grant from the United States Government of thirty per cent of the total amount expended for material and labor, estimated to be about \$9,000.00, to be used for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a school house in and for said School District.

"The ballots to be voted upon and cast at said election, shall have printed the foregoing proposition, with the words: FOR said bond issue and said annual tax levy.  AGAINST said bond issue and said annual tax levy.
